HB 3169 RELATING TO THE STATEWIDE TRAIL AND ACCESS PROGRAM

HB 3169 wouldprovide for reallocation of money from recreational fuel taxes to the trail and access program, while deleting references to the general fund.

Our statement on this measure is compiled from voluntarily submitted opinions of the listed academic reviewers, ans as such, does not constitute an institutional position of the University of Hawaii.

In general, we support the intent of this measure to solidify the funding for Na Ala Hele. However, we are concerned about the reference to commercial use of public trails and access. What exactly does this mean? Is Na Ala Hele entering the business of ecotourism promotion? Without specific information on the extent of tourism promotion, we are left with an uneasy feeling about prospects for equestrian, or even motorized vehicle use of trails. What are the goals of this effort, and who sets the standards for use? In view of prior experiences with commercial use of natural resources, we caution Na Ala Hele to be mindful of other competing use scenarios that have unfolded in Hawaii in the wake of commercialization of public assets.
