

Korean Ministerial Appointments to Hawaii Methodist Churches: 1906–2000

Prior to the first official appointment of ministers of the Hawaii Mission of the Methodist Episcopal Church at the end of December 1905, many Methodist ministers had been leading and ministering churches for Caucasian, Japanese, and Korean congregations. This introduction describes the historical background of the 1905 appointment.

The Beginning of Methodism in Hawaii

Protestant Christianity in Hawaii was established in 1819 by the Congregational denomination (the present United Church of Christ). By 1839 the Hawaiian Congregational Board claimed 15,000 converts in a population of little more than 130,000. In 1855 the Methodist bishop in San Francisco appointed the Reverend W. S. Turner to establish a Methodist church in downtown Honolulu.¹ For the next two years the charge flourished. John T. Waterhouse, a prominent merchant, contributed land. In 1856 King Kamehameha IV granted a charter, making it the only Methodist church in America opened under a royal charter granted by a king. Under this charter, Methodists constructed a sanctuary seating two hundred persons. Unfortunately, trustees soon began to quarrel about the building debt, and some members began to find fault with their minister. Turner left, and his successors were unable to recapture the original enthusiasm. The transient congregation withered to four men and three women. In 1862 the downtown property was sold to the Anglican (Episcopal) Church, which was just making its entry into Hawaii at the invitation of King Kamehameha IV and Queen Emma.

In 1887, a fellowship of Japanese Christians in San Francisco heard of the plight of Japanese sugarplantation laborers in Hawaii. These immigrant workers were mostly young and unmarried. They were lonely, and the lack of customary restraints made them susceptible to vice and immoral practices. Eventually, the Reverend Kanichi Miyama, ordained a deacon of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1886, was sent to Honolulu on March 16, 1888. On July 27, 1888, a Japanese Methodist Church was organized as a part of the Pacific Coast Japanese Mission. This was the beginning of the second attempt at Hawaii Methodism.

While the Japanese work was going on, the First

Methodist Episcopal Church was reconstituted in 1894 when the Reverend Harcourt Peck, the secretary of the Honolulu YMCA, was appointed pastor by Methodist Bishop Merriman C. Harris of San Francisco. The Reverend Peck also became the first superintendent of the Honolulu Methodist churches. In 1897, Dr. George L. Pearson succeeded the Reverend Peck in Hawaii as the superintendent and pastor of the First Methodist Church. All the work in Hawaii was still a part of the Pacific Coast Japanese Mission. In the spring of 1904, when the Methodist General Conference met in Los Angeles, it was decided that the Hawaii work should no longer be a part of the Pacific Coast Japanese Mission but should be organized as the Hawaii Mission of the California Conference. The First Session of the Hawaii Mission was held at the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Honolulu, from December 27 to December 31 in 1905.

Prior to the coming of Japanese contract workers, Chinese workers were brought to Hawaii in

1865 and assigned to plantations on all islands. Chinese-language services were begun by the Congregational and Anglican churches. In 1905, a fraternal agreement was made between the Hawaiian (Congregational) Board and the Methodists that the Methodists would be in charge of Japanese and Korean work and that the Congregationalists were to care for the Chinese and Hawaiians.²

The Arrival of Korean Methodists

Through dealings among representative of the Hawaii Sugar Planters' Association (HSPA); Horace Allen, the American minister to Korea; and David W. Deshler, owner of the East-West Development Company in Korea,³ the first boatload of 102 Koreans landed at Honolulu Harbor on January 13, 1903. Among the passengers were many fellow church members of Nai-Ri Methodist Church in Chemulpo (also known as Yong-dong or Chemulpo Wesleyan Church).

The Reverend George Heber Jones, minister of Nai-Ri Church and superintendent of the Methodist Church in the Chemulpo region, played an

important role in persuading his church members to go to Hawaii. When recruiters of immigrants to Hawaii encountered difficulty in convincing Koreans, the Reverend Jones assured them of the pleasant weather, educational opportunity and higher wages, free housing, and medical care⁴ and encouraged church members to go to Hawaii.⁵ with Jones's encouragement, fifty members (men and women) of Nai-Ri Church⁶ applied to immigrate, along with some laborers at Inchon Harbor.⁷

When the first group of Korean immigrants gathered to embark at Chemulpo on December 22, 1902, Jones "held a large tent meeting in order to inspire them with laudable ambitions and prepare them for the strange experiences so soon to overtake them." In addition, Jones "supplied them with a liberal amount of good literature" and "also handed a few of the leaders among them letters of introduction to Superintendent George L. Pearson of the Methodist Mission in Hawaii."⁸

During the ten-day voyage from Nagasaki to Honolulu, exhorters Chung Soo Ahn⁹ and Yee Chai Kim¹⁰ from the Chemulpo Nai-Ri Methodist Church organized a prayer meeting in the steerage of their ship and carried on Christian work

among the fellow emigrants. Exhorter Yee Chai Kim preached the gospel at the prayer meeting.¹¹ By the time they landed in Honolulu, they had a Methodist Episcopal Church organized. Fiftyeight of the first group of 102 immigrants were members.¹² They were greeted at the Immigration Station by the Reverend Pearson, who had been apprised of their coming.¹³

This first group of Korean immigrants was sent to Mokuleia Camp of Waialua Plantation on the North Shore of Oahu. A second boat of sixty-four Korean immigrants arrived on March 2, 1903. The interpreter on board was Soon Hyun, who attended Nai-Ri Methodist Church while he was employed at the East-West Development Company. This group was sent to Kahuku Plantation on the North Shore of Oahu.

As more Koreans arrived, the Reverend Pearson followed up his good work, visited all the plantations where Koreans were dispatched, and succeeded in opening a few night schools in English for the benefit of Koreans.¹⁴

The last two Koreans landing in Honolulu from the S.S. *Mongolia* on August 8, 1905, were Kyeng Ho Moon and Woo Chai Kim. Moon was a local preacher of Nai-Ri Church and immigrated to Hawaii with his family on March 14, 1904. Moon went to Korea and came back with Kim. Kim was a local preacher of Kanghwa Island, just across from Chemulpo. The manifest of alien passengers for this voyage contains the note, "Kim was ticketed to San Francisco but elected to stop in Honolulu to assist Rev. Wadman." Both Moon and Kim, however, went on to the United States mainland shortly thereafter.

Establishment of the Korean Methodist Churches in Hawaii and the Revival of Hawaii Methodism

The fifty-eight-member "Korean Methodist Congregation" on the first boat to Honolulu started "informal" worship services together with the immigrants from the second boat not long after they settled in the Kahuku-Waialua area, probably sometime in March 1903.¹⁵ They were already in contact with Methodist Superintendent George Pearson, to whom the Reverend Jones of Chemulpo had written a letter of introduction.

Soon after his arrival in October 1903, Chung Soo Lim "reorganized" the worship service at the Kahuku-Waialua Korean Church,¹⁶ closely following the North American Methodist discipline.¹⁷

His statement on the church "reorganization" in the *Autobiography* is followed by the sentence, "In the month of August. Rev. Pearson came to Kahuku and preached at the Korean Methodist Church," giving the impression that the "reorganization" took place before Pearson's preaching in August.

Meanwhile in Honolulu, Chung Soo Ahn and Pyeng Kil Woo (later known as Pyung Koo Yoon)¹⁸ contacted Superintendent Pearson to organize the Korean Evangelical Society in Honolulu in November 1903. It is likely that Woo, Ahn, and Chi Pom Hong¹⁹ were leading the Society until the arrival of Seung Ha Hong.²⁰ Upon his arrival in Honolulu on February 18, 1904, Seung Ha Hong took charge of the Mission as a local preacher. In March 1904, the Mission moved to a larger house on Emma and School Streets.

The Korean Evangelical Mission received regular church status in April 1905 from John W. Wadman, who succeeded Pearson as Hawaii Methodist Mission superintendent at the end of 1904. From May 1, they started sending Pyeng Kil Woo, Kyo Tam Lee and Hyung Choo Lim as local preachers to various plantations. In July 1905 the Honolulu Korean Church moved to a larger house at 1485 Nuuanu Street. About this time Seung Ha Hong returned to Korea due to his poor health, and Chan Ho Min from California took charge of the Church.

When the First Session of the Hawaii Mission of the Methodist Episcopal Church was held December 27 and 31, 1905, there was one Caucasian church, eleven Japanese churches, and nine-

of Seung Ha Hong, Pyung Koo Yoon, and others (p. 8), but he did not specify the establishment date or organizer. Hyun's Autobiography includes several names but points out that Seung Ha Hong was appointed as a local preacher (p. 12). This statement is followed by "In the month of November the same 1903" and gives the impression that the Honolulu church was established either earlier than November or in November. However, Seung Ha Hong arrived in Honolulu on February 14, 1904, according to the passenger list. Man-yul Lee points out that Hong was still in Korea at the end of 1903. teen Korean churches. One Caucasian minister was appointed to the English church in Honolulu, and six Japanese ministers were assigned to six Japanese churches for 1906. Five other Japanese plantation churches were yet to be supplied with ministers. At the same time, nine ministerial appointments were made for Korean churches in Hawaii. Eight other plantation-churches were yet to have ministers.²¹ In addition, Pyung Koo Yoon (Pyeng Kil Woo) was appointed editor of the *Korean Christian Advocate*, Hun Joo Song as the publisher of the *Korean Christian Advocate*, and Chi Sung Yee (Lee) as the superintendent of the Night Schools and Gospel Society.

The following list of ministerial appointments was compiled from Official Minutes of Annual Session of the Hawaii Mission of the Methodist Episcopal Church (present United Methodist Church) for the corresponding years (the name of the Conference changed subsequently). A minister's known affiliated church in Korea prior to 1912 is included in parentheses. From 1962, a minister's appointment to a church with other than a Korean congregation is noted in parentheses.
