TONIGHT'S PLAY

Though well received by critics at the time of its original Broadway performances some ten years ago, THE DAMASK CHEEK was never an outstanding commercial success. It has, however, been enjoyed in a good many college and community theatre productions. One of van Druten's better plays, and in some ways his best, it was selected as this year's Summer Theatre production in part because it seemed suitable summer fare. Another important reason was that it required few men, while its women, in addition to outnumbering the men, were of types readily available in Summer Session student bodies.

THE SUMMER THEATRE

The University of Hawaii Summer Theatre is an activity of the Department of Drama and Theatre and of the Summer Session. Its purpose, a dual one, is to provide a laboratory for summer students interested in play production, whether taking courses in the Department or not, and to present to summer students an example of living theatre. Other activities of the Department, in addition to academic courses leading to the B.A. and M.A. degrees, are the University of Hawaii Theatre Group (with the Associated Students), the undergraduate producing organization during the regular session; and the University of Hawaii Theatre, which shows occasional foreign and historic films.

PAINT YOUR WAGON

Opening August 12, the Honolulu Community Theatre will present its final production of the season, PAINT YOUR WAGON, a musical play by Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe, the authors of BRIGADOON. PAINT YOUR WAGON is the story of the California gold rush, its miners, can-can girls, missionaries, and other colorful folk. The play is scheduled for four weeks, with five performances each week, Wednesday through Saturday evenings plus matinees each Saturday.
