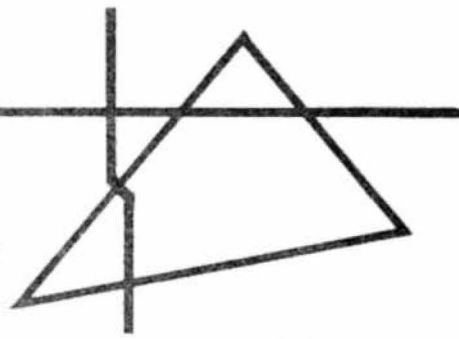

Pacific Studies Grant Spinoffs: Resource Acquisition

Pacific Studies Grant Spinoffs: Travel Money

The budget submitted for the grant carries an item covering the cost of transportation of a faculty member to Fort Moresby, PNG for the 8th Waigani Seminar, May 5-10, 1974. The theme of the Seminar (Newsletter, VI:1) is "Education in Melanesia." Participation in the Seminar is still being accepted by its sponsors. Another item in the approved budget will help cover the travel expenses of a faculty member participating in a relevant mainland conference.

Faculty members planning to present papers on Pacific Islands culture change at either such meeting and requiring assistance to attend are invited to submit an appropriate request, with supporting data.

Multi-Institution Pacific Research - Ciguatera

The University of Hawaii, the Institute Recherches Medicales Louis Malardé of Papeete, and the Department of Marine Biochemistry of the University of Tokyo have set up a South Pacific Commission financed program for cooperative study of ciguatera, a disease that results from the eating of certain coral reef fishes. There will be a SPC sponsored conference held in January of 1974 (probably in Honolulu) for working out the details. Multi-disciplinary in nature, the project will cover the biology, chemistry and pharmacology of the toxin.
