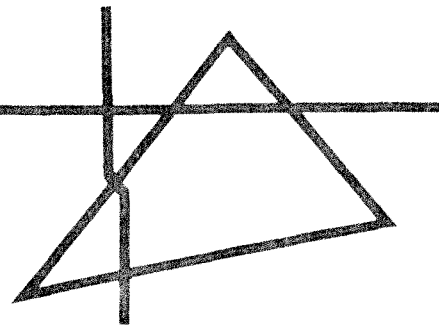

## VISITORS

IKINI HALLOWAY, Chief of Staff in the national newsroom of the National Broadcasting Commission in Papua New Guinea is at the East-West Center as a Jefferson Fellow. She can be contacted at the Communications Institute during her stay here.

BERNARD SMITH, President of the Australian Academy of the Humanities, retired Power Professor of Contemporary Art, Director of the Power Institute of Fine Arts, University of Sydney, author of European Vision and the South Pacific (1960) and numerous other books and articles on art, history and literature will be visiting Honolulu from April 8 to April 19. While here he will present an original public lecture: "Art as Information. Work of the Artists that Traveled with Cook" at the Honolulu Academy of Arts, April 11 at 8:00 P.M. He will be staying at the Kaimana Beach Hotel and may be contacted there. Dr. Smith is currently working on a catalogue raisonné of the work of artists and others who traveled with Capt. Cook.

ROBERT KEITH-REID, chief reporter for the Fiji Times, Suva, arrived here at the beginning of the semester on a Fulbright grant through the PINA (Pacific Islands News Association). He is the first to receive the grant which is part of a three-year experimental program to bring Pacific Island news people to Hawaii for work with the School of Journalism and as interns with private newspapers in Hawaii.
