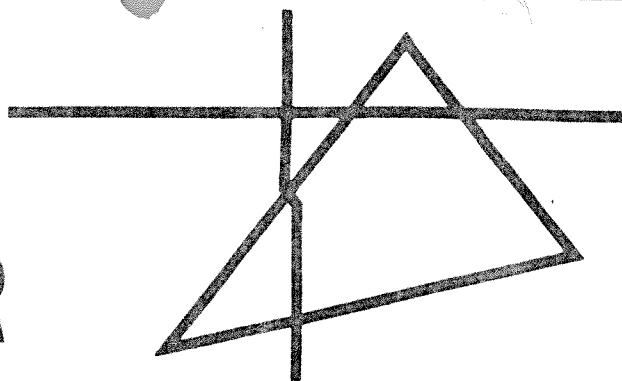

Many of the Samoan students are in Hawaii to gain experience and gather as much knowledge as we can in the different fields that we have chosen. Eventually many of us hope to return to Samoa and use the skills and experiences that we will gain here. We also hope to promote good will in the Hawaiian Community and bring a better understanding of our Samoan culture and heritage amongst ourselves, fellow students, and the community.

Every school year we have new incoming students who find college life an unfamiliar experience. With this in mind SI'UFOFOGA is also planned to help inform them of the different services available on campus, to provide information on academic assistance, and familiarize them with other students on campus who may have similar interests and academic goals.

FAGOGO: FABLES FROM SAMOA

A new book in Samoan and English has been brought to our attention by BARBARA SMITH of the UH Department of Music. She says royalties from the sale of the volume will go to Nelson Memorial Public Library, Apia and she notes the book's potential usefulness to Samoans living outside of Samoa, and to children of Samoans born elsewhere.

Fagogo is a collection of folktales and fables selected from over 200 items that were recorded by RICHARD MOYLE in the course of a comprehensive ethnomusicological survey completed in 1969. The stories included in the volume contain songs sung by the narrators, and were selected largely according to which stories the Samoans appeared to enjoy most.

Fagogo: Fables from Samoa in Samoan and English, by Richard Moyle is published by the Auckland and Oxford University Press, Auckland, New Zealand. There is no price information available.

TRUST TERRITORY 1980 CENSUS

Dr. MICHAEL LEVIN, Census Bureau, Department of Commerce, recently sent the results of the 1980 Trust Territory census. Because much of the census taking required travel by boat, many of the enumerators were recruited and trained among teachers who assemble at certain sites in September to pick up school materials. Consequently, the census was taken 6 months after the mainland count.

The Northern Mariana Islands, reported in 1970 as part of the Trust Territory, were counted separately by the Census Bureau in April 1980. The preliminary population count there was 16,862, with 3,463 housing units.

The totals are preliminary and subject to review and possible revision. Final totals are expected to be released later this year.

The preliminary counts of individual districts in the Trust Territory, excluding the Northern Mariana Islands, are:

PIP/PAAC REPORT

The following was submitted by KAREN KNUDSEN, Pacific Islands Outreach Coordinator:

1. "Tourism in the Pacific: Expectations and Realities" is the title of a student conference to be held on Saturday, December 12, 1981, at Iolani high school from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Topics to be addressed range from "Is Tourism an Economic Alternative for Pacific Island Nations?" to "The Impact of Tourism on Local Cultures." Anyone interested is welcome to attend.
2. PAAC's first student conference of the 1981-82 school year was held at Mid-Pacific Institute on Saturday, November 21, 1981. About 130 students attended the conference "Hawaii - Cultural Crossroads of the Pacific." The conference included a dance demonstration/presentation by Vita Akapito, Mari Kim, Tina Takashy, and Margaret Cholymay from Truk, Federated States of Micronesia.
3. PAAC's International Christmas Party was held on Wednesday, December 9, 1981. PAAC club members had a chance to learn about how Christmas and the New Year holidays are celebrated around the world. Pacific Islands were well represented at the party which featured palm frond ornament weaving and carole singing in different languages.
4. There was a good turn out for the Pacific Islands luncheon seminar held on Thursday, November 19, 1981 at the Kahala Hilton. Fifty-seven people heard Dr. Norman Meller, UH Professor Emeritus of Political Science, Mr. Floyd Takeuchi, editorial writer for the Honolulu ADVERTISER, and Mr. Marcelino Actouka, a Ph.D. candidate in International Relations from Ponape address "The Long Transition: Micronesia's Road to Self Government."
5. A discussion and slide show on Western and American Samoa by Karen Knudsen was the focus of November's Student Forum Series. Ten students participated in the session held at PAAC on Wednesday, November 18, 1981.
