With the frosh a real part of the branch, the ASUH began its activities with a Counselors' Luncheon in October. Principals and counsellors from all Big Island high schools

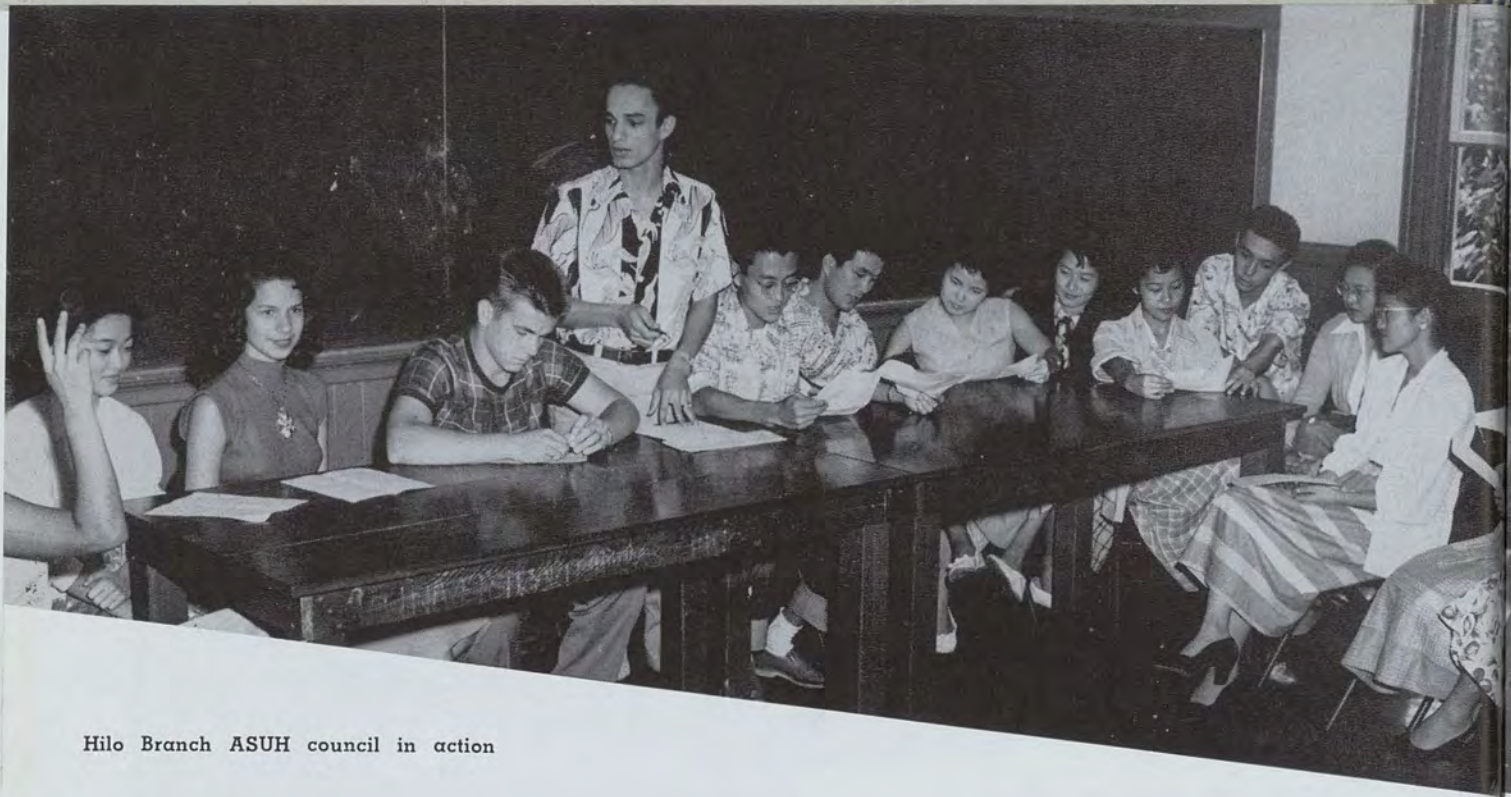
were invited to meet with the Hilo Branch staff, ASUH officers, Department of Public Instruction personnel and community representatives to discuss public relations of the Hilo Branch.

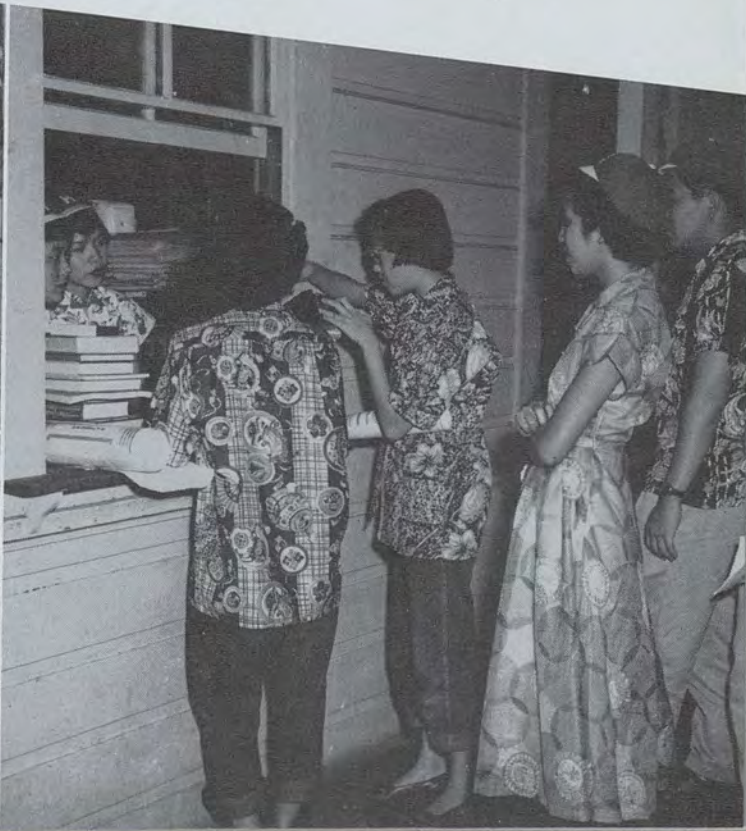

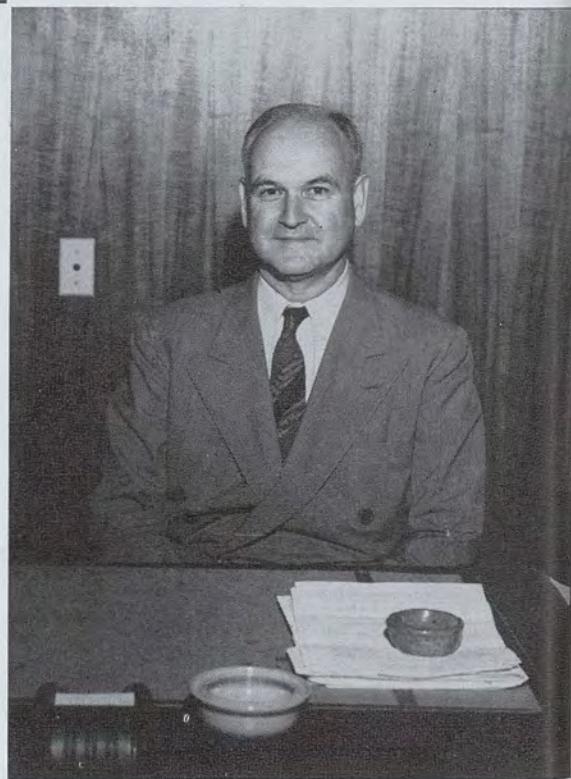
President's Message

Board of Regents

General supervision and control of the University of Hawaii is vested in the Board of Regents, composed of representatives from all the major islands in the Hawaiian group as reflected by the territory-wide character of the board. The 1952-53 Football season opened with an entirely new coaching staff at the helm of the Rainbow football squad.

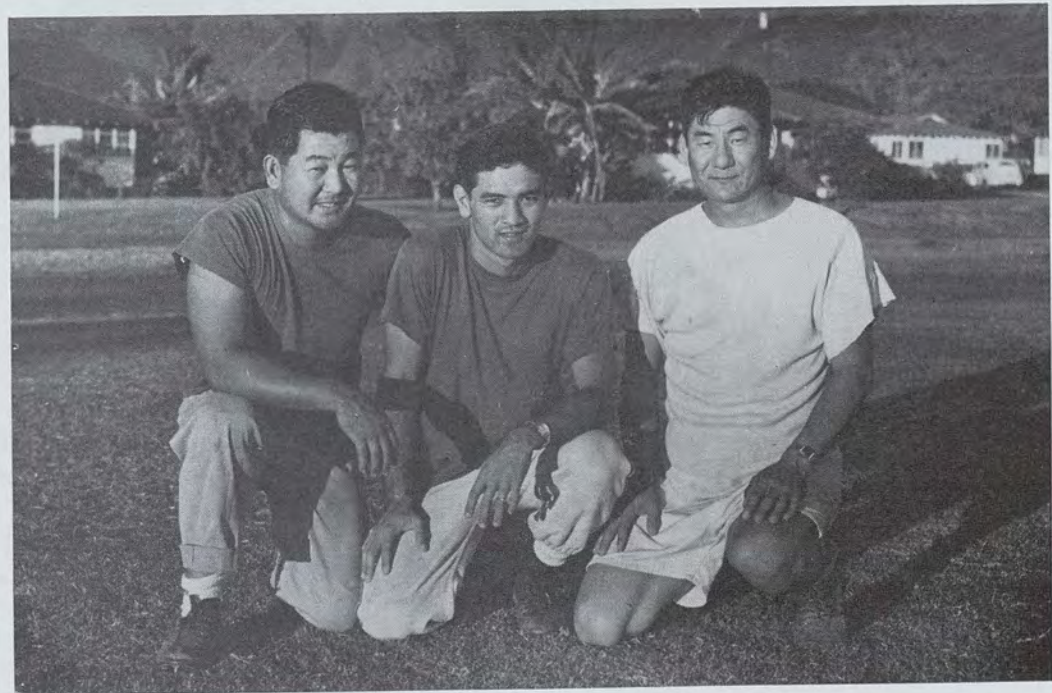

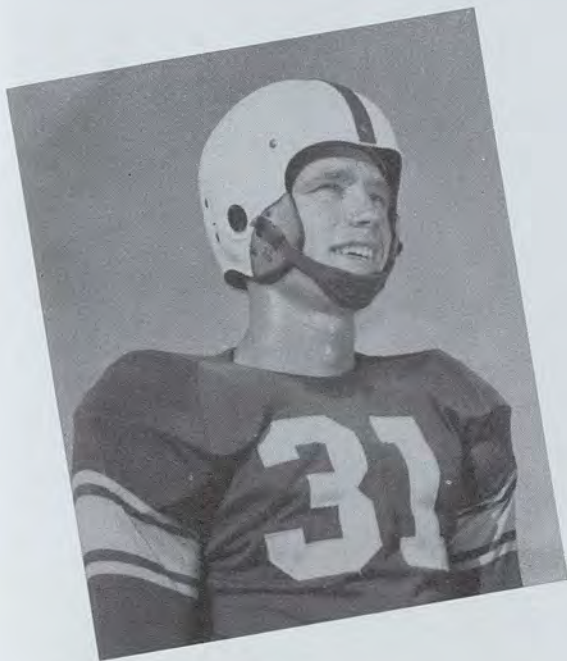

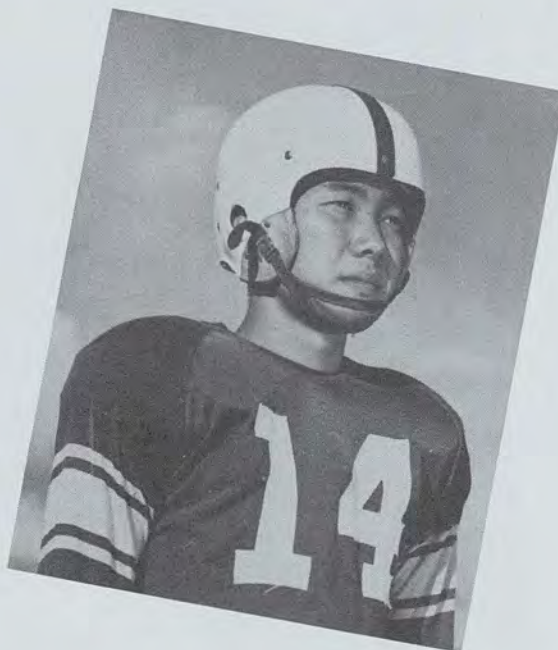

Mosher, Ed Malapit, David Mendez, Arnold Naumu, the Price brothers, and Dick Ueoka helped with body contact.

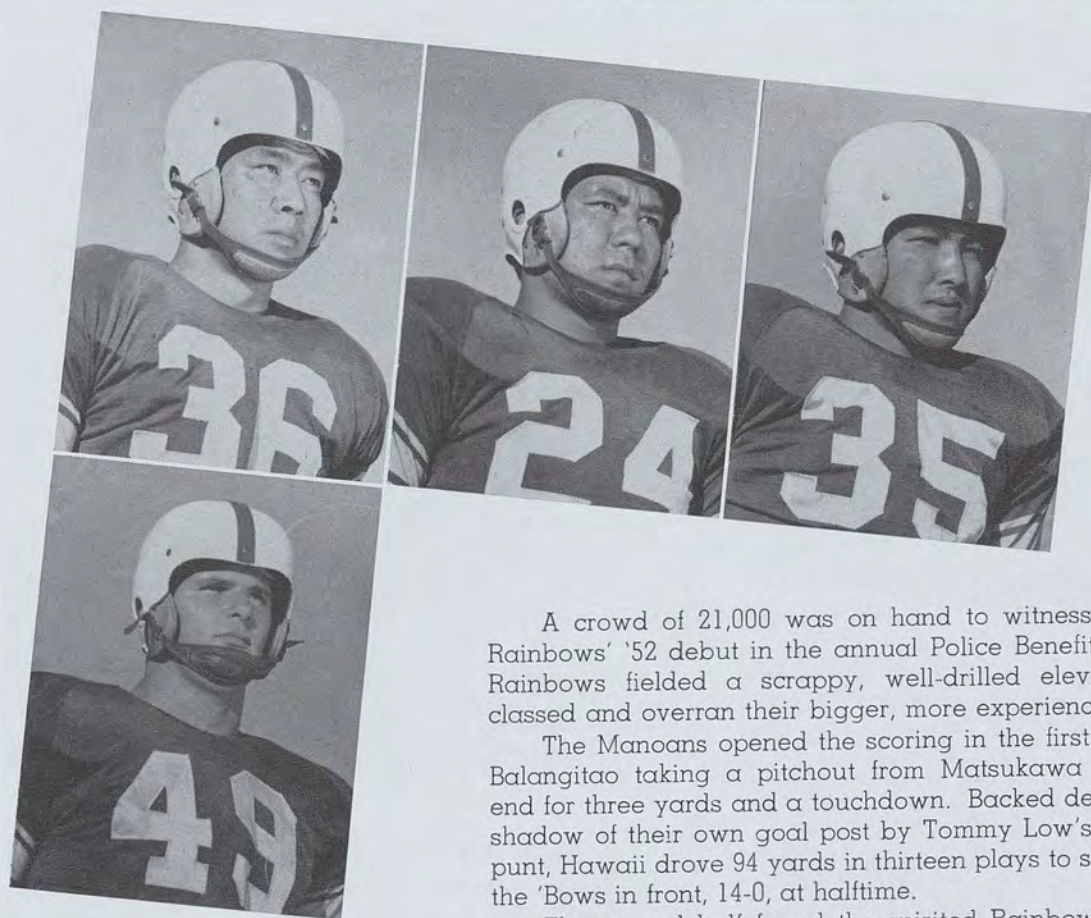

A crowd of 21,000 was on hand to witness the Roaring Rainbows' '52 debut in the annual Police Benefit game. The Rainbows fielded a scrappy, well-drilled eleven that out-classed and overran their bigger, more experienced foes, 42-0.

The Manoans opened the scoring in the first quarter with Balangitao taking a pitchout from Matsukawa to circle left end for three yards and a touchdown. Backed deep within the shadow of their own goal post by Tommy Low's coffin corner punt, Hawaii drove 94 yards in thirteen plays to score. This put the 'Bows in front, 14-0, at halftime.

The second half found the spirited Rainbows rampaging over the hapless Townie goal line for four more touchdowns. After six minutes of scrimmage, Balangitao streaked over to score, to begin the UH touchdown parade. Mendez tallied with a minute left in the third quarter then added his fourth extra point. Another 14 points were scored in the final quarter.

Sure blocking and crisp tackling characterized the collegians, play throughout the game. The one-sided statistics showed the 'Bows chalked up 12 first downs against one for the Townies and a net 218 yards gained against a minus two.

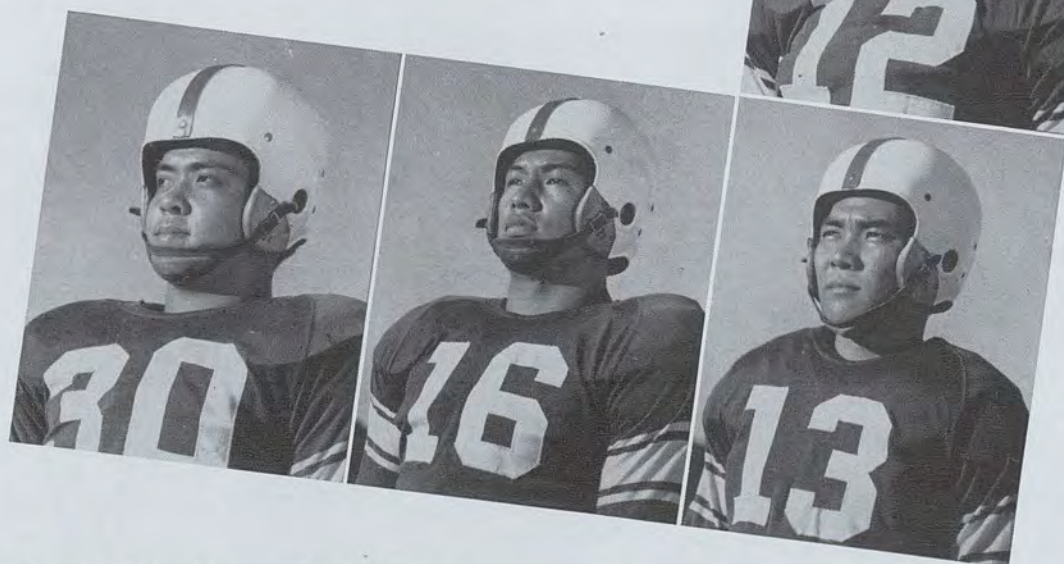
Fresh from their success against the Townies, the UH Rainbows traveled to Tucson to meet the Arizona Wildcats in their 1952 intercollegiate opener. The Rainbows, making their initial mainland appearance under new mentor Vasconcellos, were swamped 57-7 by a powerful Wildcat squad.

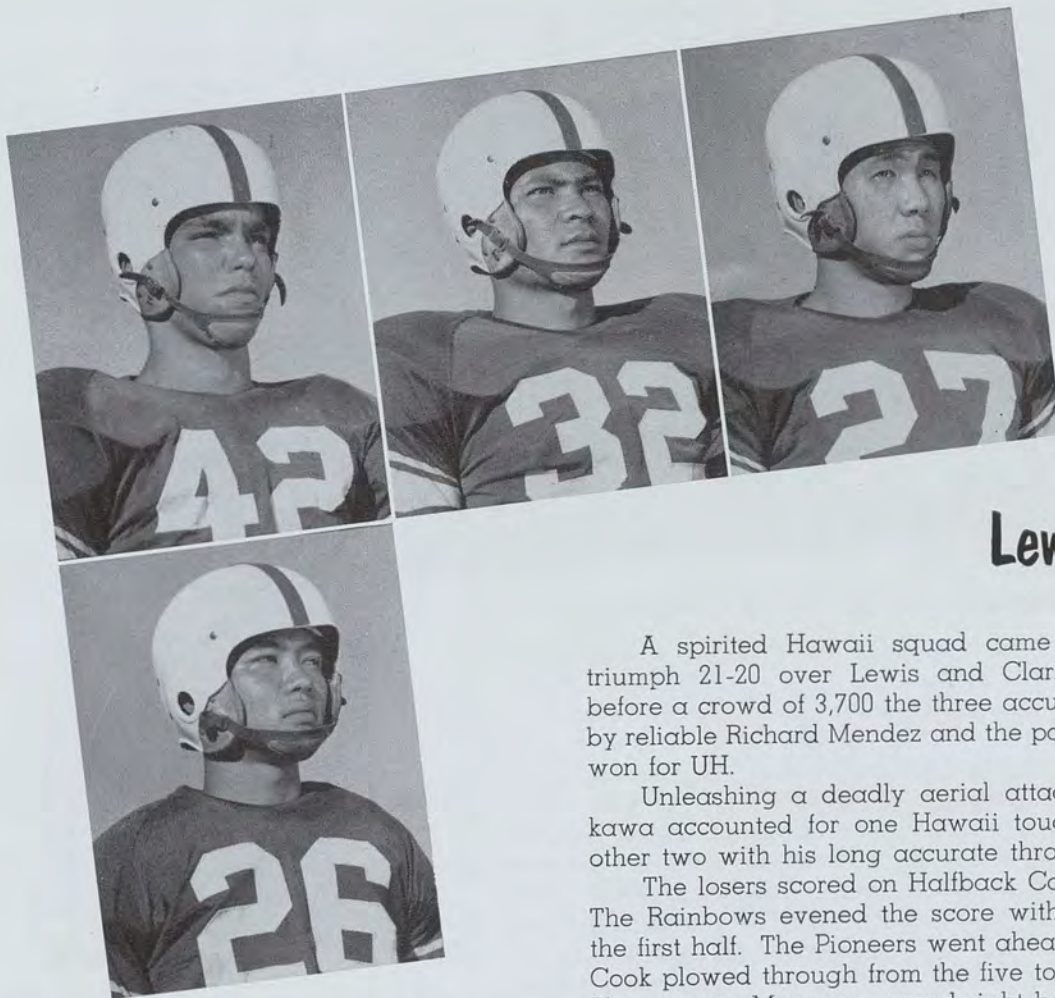

A spirited Hawaii squad came from behind twice to triumph 21-20 over Lewis and Clark. Played at Portland before a crowd of 3,700 the three accurate conversions booted by reliable Richard Mendez and the passing of Joe Matsukawa won for UH.

Unleashing a deadly aerial attack, Quarterback Matsukawa accounted for one Hawaii touchdown and set up the other two with his long accurate throws.

The losers scored on Halfback Caley Cook's 18 yard run. The Rainbows evened the score with one minute to play in the first half. The Pioneers went ahead in the third quarter as Cook plowed through from the five to climax a 62 yard drive. The scrappy Manoans surged right back, Matsukawa passing 34 yards to Ellsworth Bush who scampered over the goal-line untouched. Mendez made good the second of his conversions.

With four minutes remaining, fullback George Fujiwara plunged over from the two, capping a drive which featured a forty yard pass from Matsukawa to Dick Carpenter. Mendez kicked his final and game-deciding conversion.

A fighting Hawaii squad battled the heavily favored Texas Western team on even terms for three quarters before succumbing to superior weight and reserves. The final 42-26 score gives no indication of the closeness of the hard fought game. The Green and White band fought valiantly to overcome a 20-7 first quarter lead and trailed by a close 28-26 margin until the fourth quarter.

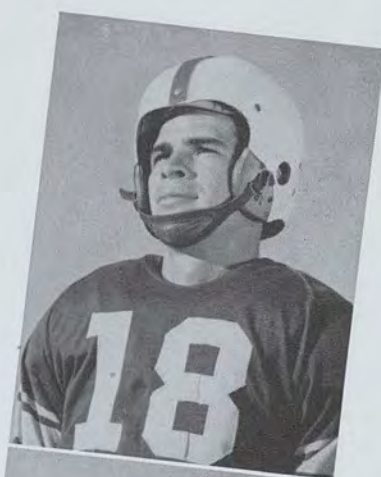
Hawaii scored first on a pass from Joe Matsukawa to stellar receiver Dick Carpenter. The Miners roared back, for a 48 yard touchdown. The El Paso collegians followed with two quick tallies, and the scoreboard read: Texas Western 20, Hawaii 7.

The Manoans came back from that jolt so superbly, that many in the stands expected to witness an upset. Matsukawa started off by firing a pass to Carpenter who went 60 yards to score. In what was probably the most exciting senior league clash in recent years, the Rainbows battled from behind to gain a 21-21 standoff with the power laden 49ers, champions of the University Invitational Conference.

Highlighting the action-packed game was the thrilling last-ditch stand by Hawaii in the dying moments of the game when the 49ers were knocking on the UH two-yard line. The senior league club, sparked by a dozen ex-UHers, grabbed a 14-0 lead behind the power running of Johnny Dang and the speed of Dick Nelson. Operating by authority of the ASUH, the Board of Athletic Control holds the reins for all competitive inter-collegiate athletics at the University of Hawaii.

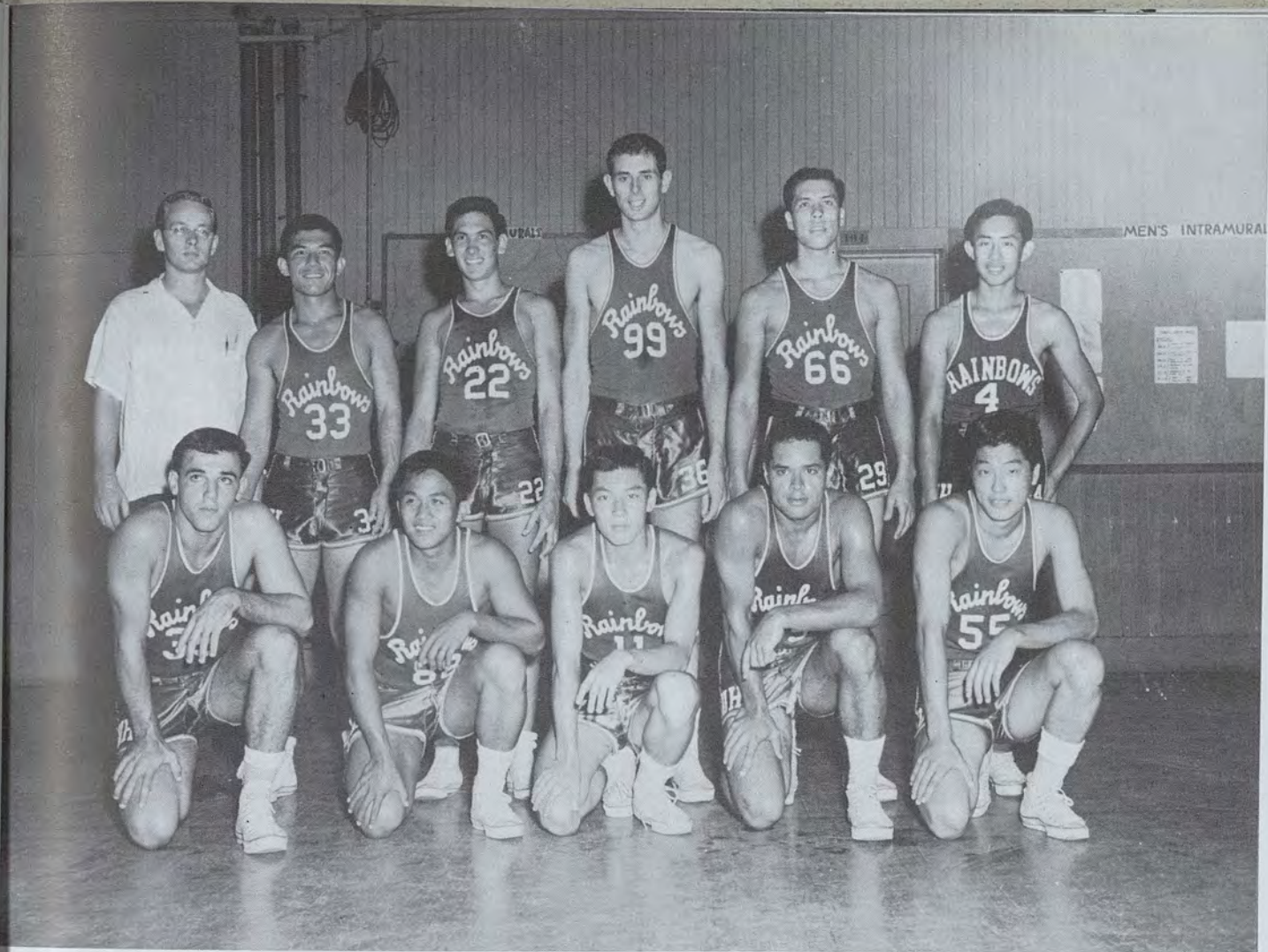

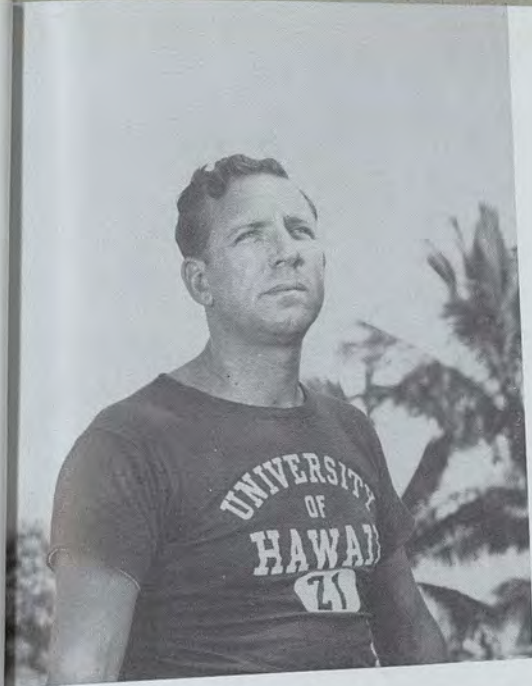

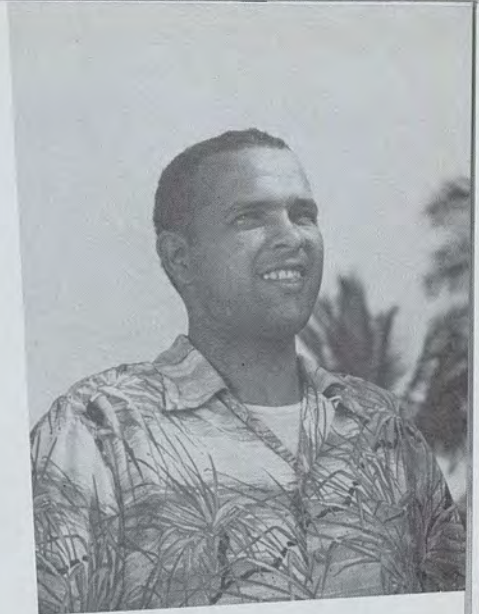


Single combat. Harvey Lee and Joe Cipriano dispute possession of the ball in mid-air.

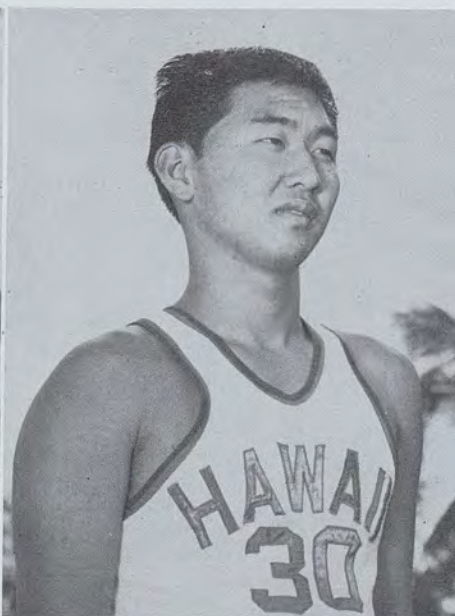

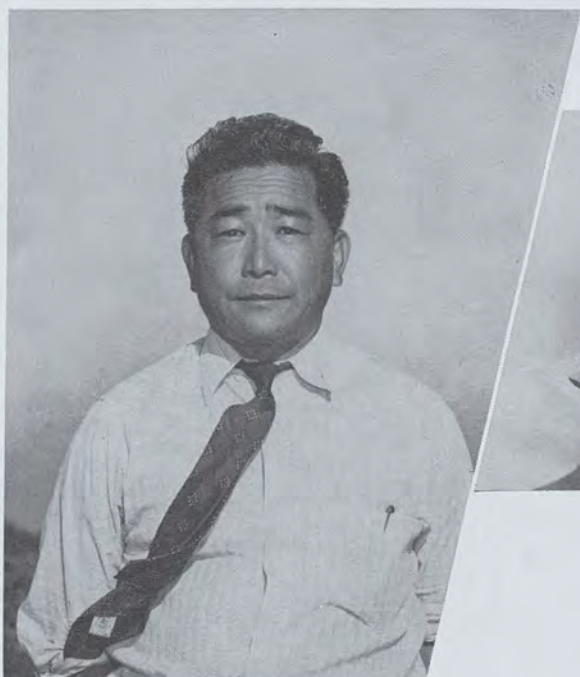

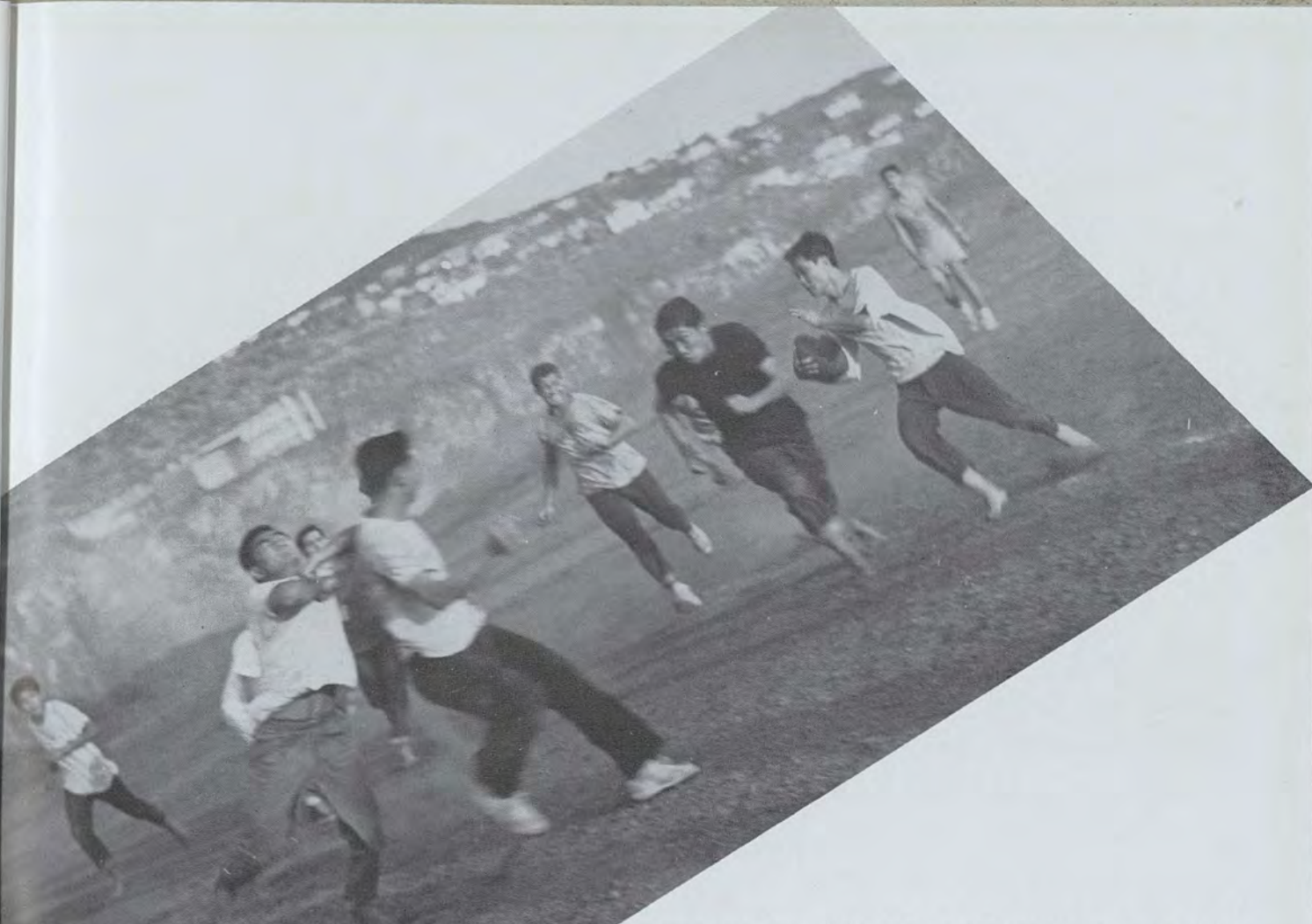

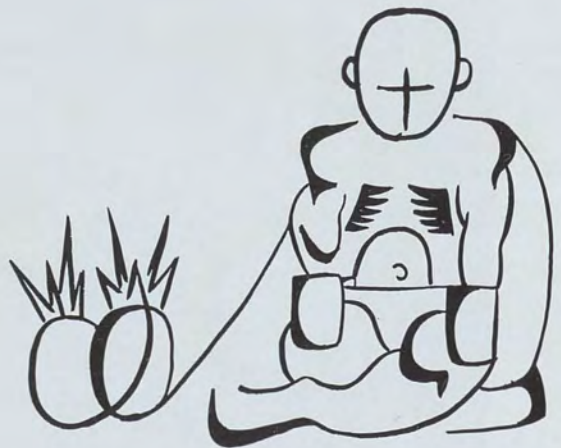

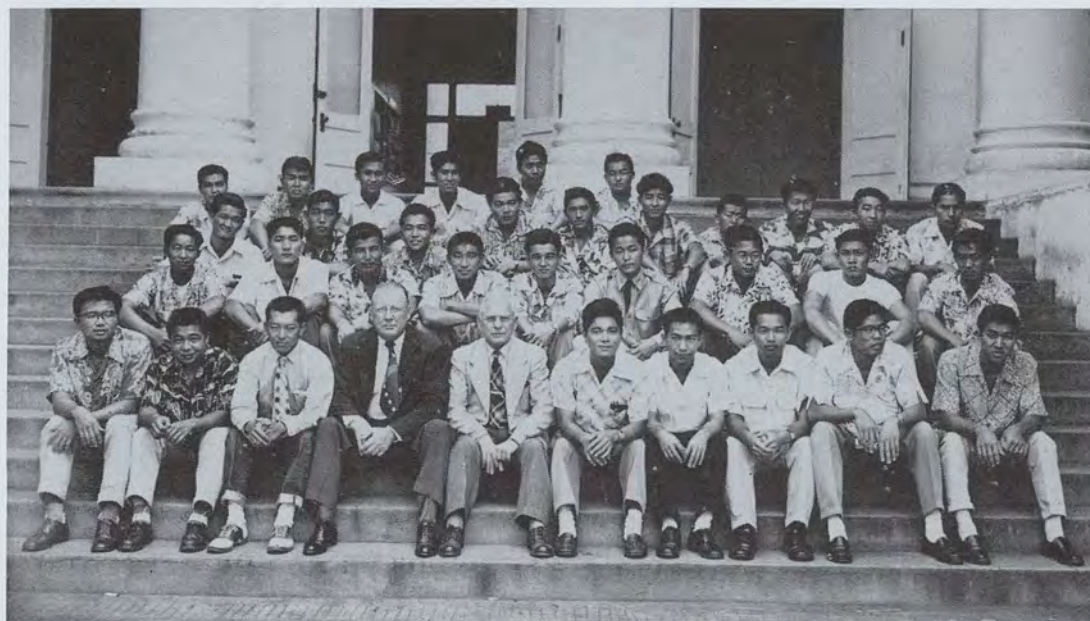
Hui O' Haumana

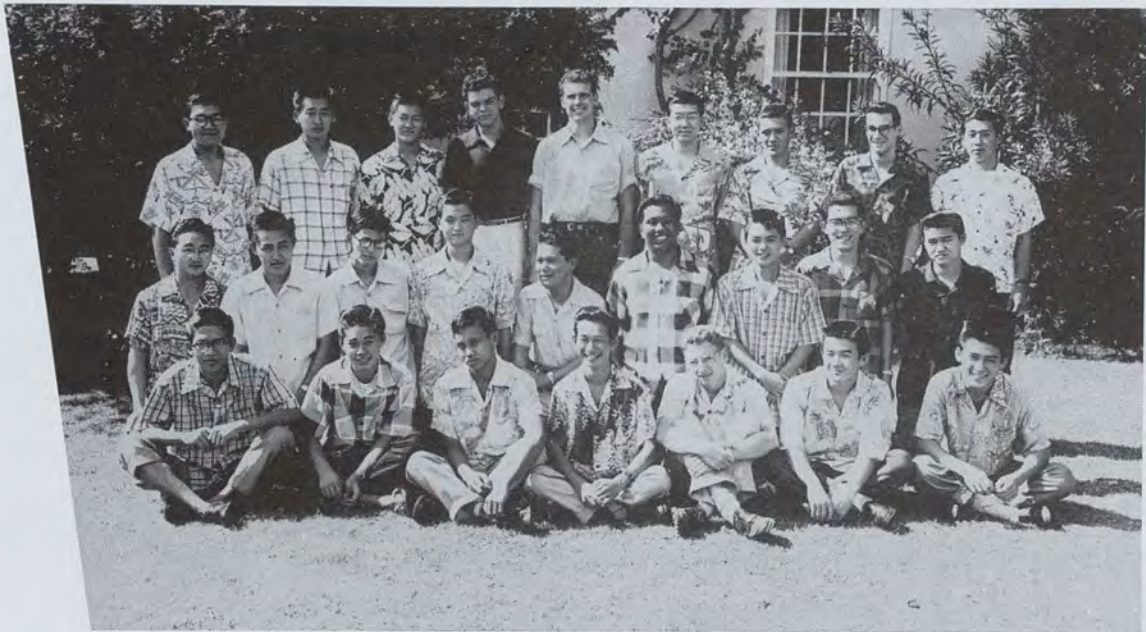

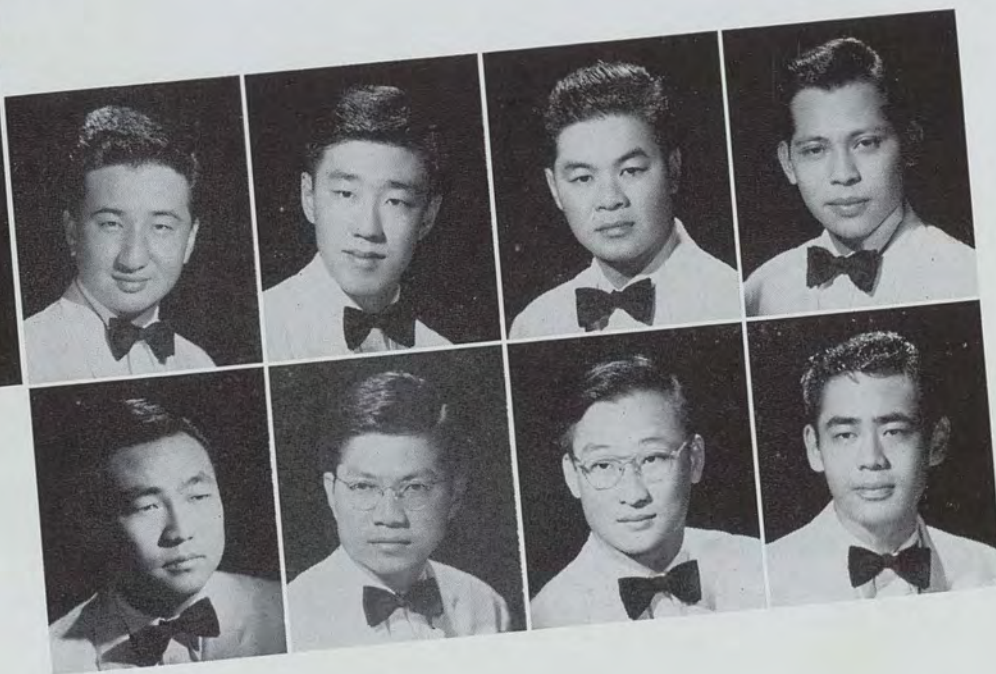

Beta Beta Gamma

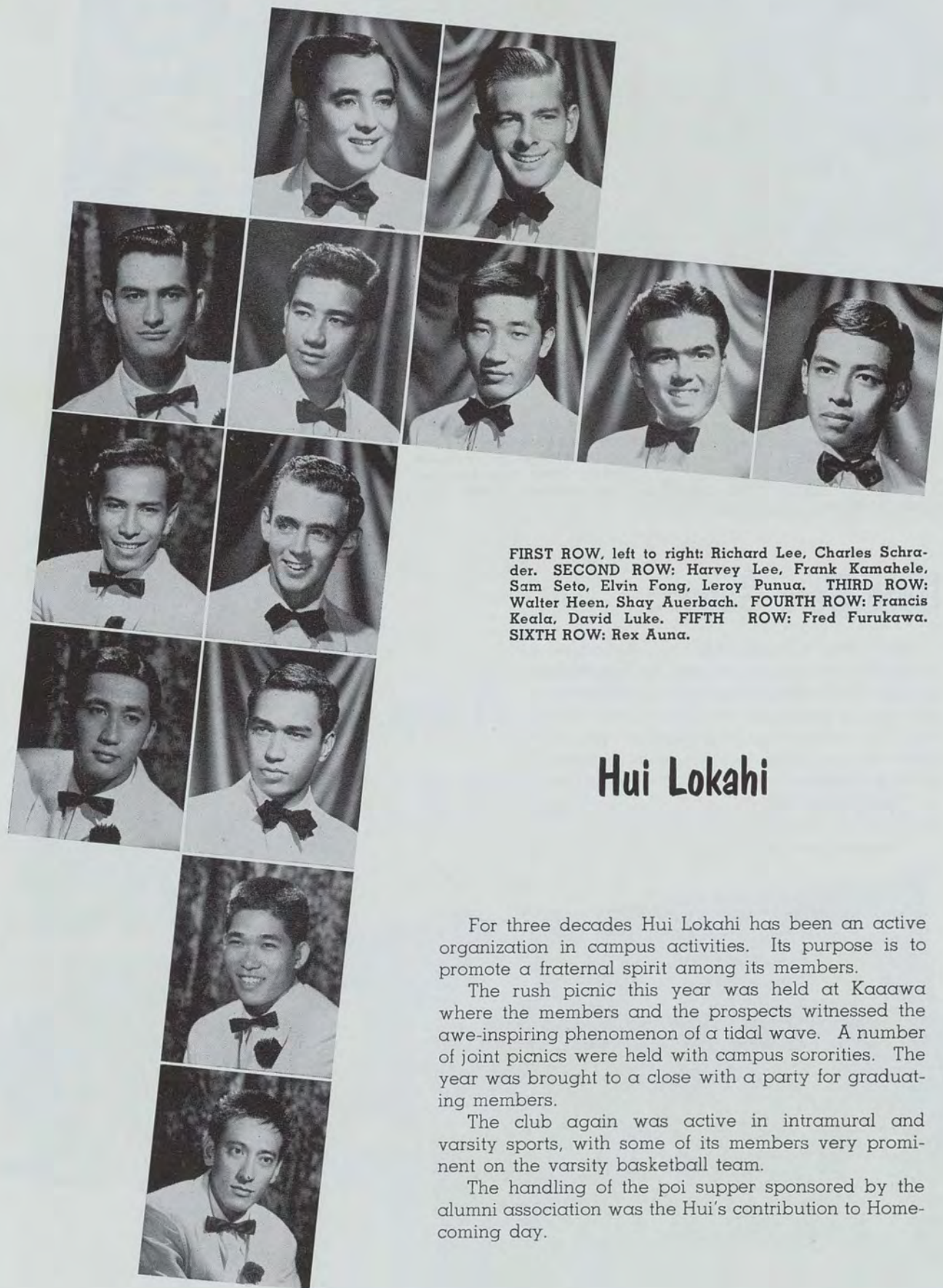

A social and cultural organization, Te Chih Sheh sorority was organized in 1930 to promote friendship among university women and to encourage participation in ASUH activities.

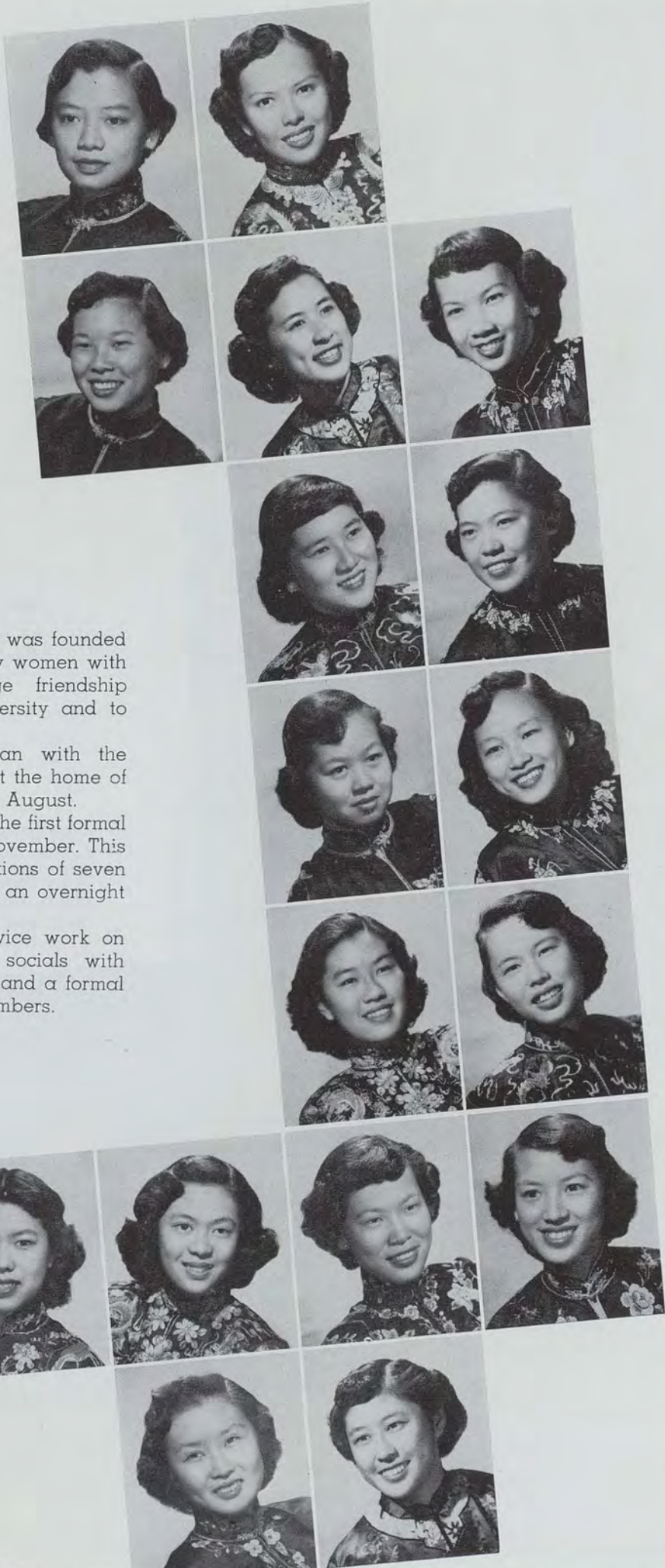

Peng Hui

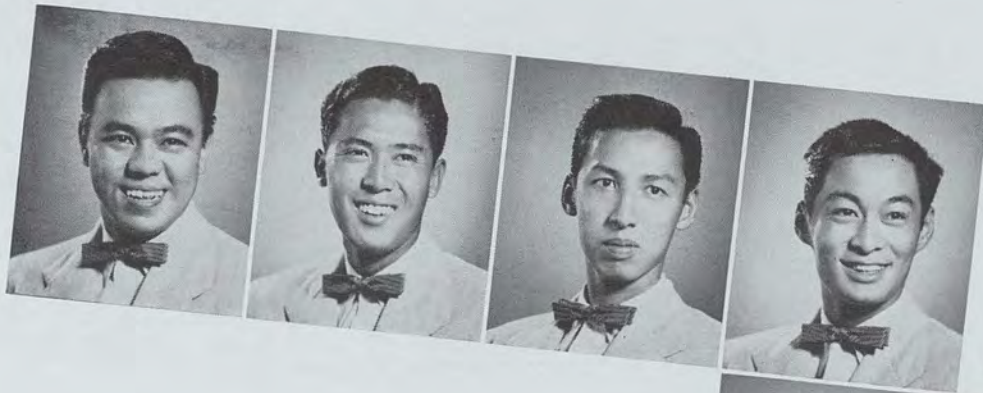
Peng Hui Fraternity, now in its 24th year, was organized with the aim of promoting friendship and cooperation on the campus and encouraging more active participation in student activities.

Advisors for the sorority were Dr. Ch'eng K'un Cheng and Mrs. Lillian Yajima.





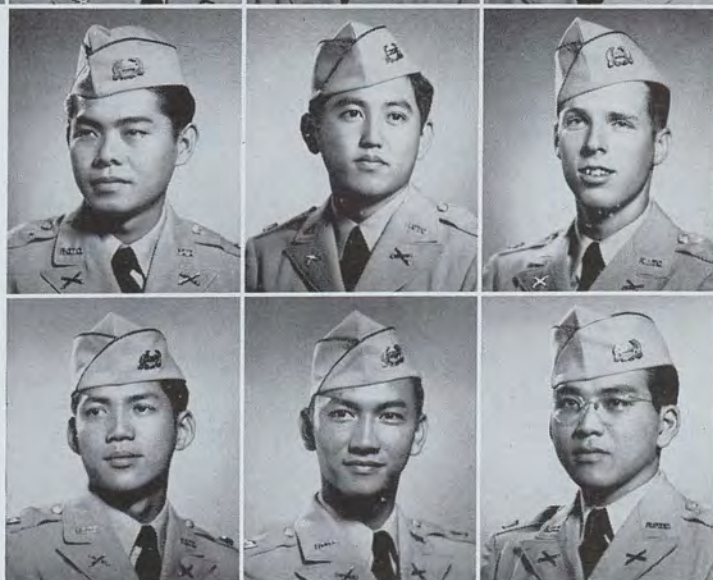

Although Kappa Epsilon Theta takes pride in the heterogeneous nature of its membership, admission into this organization is strictly invitational.

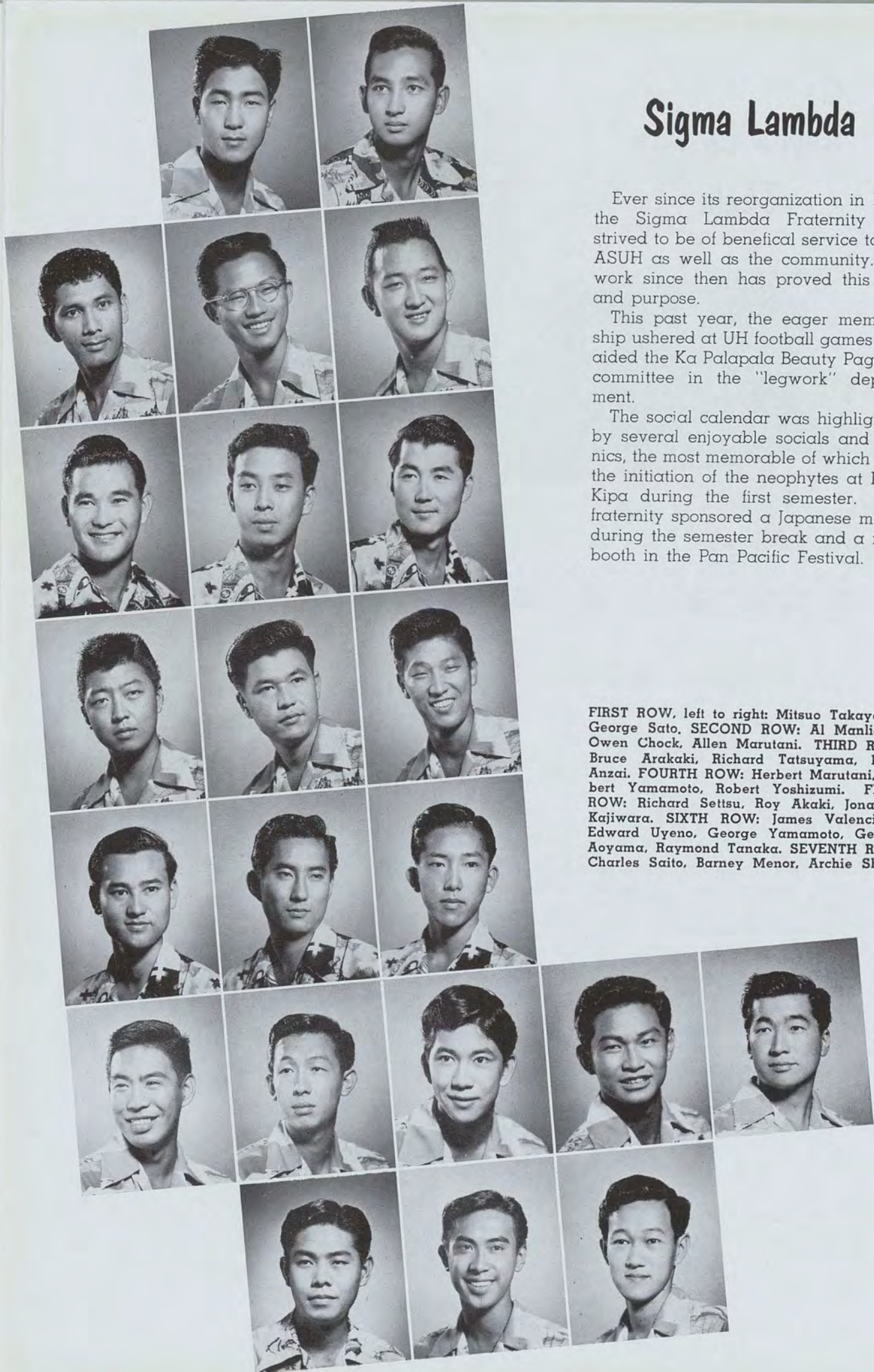

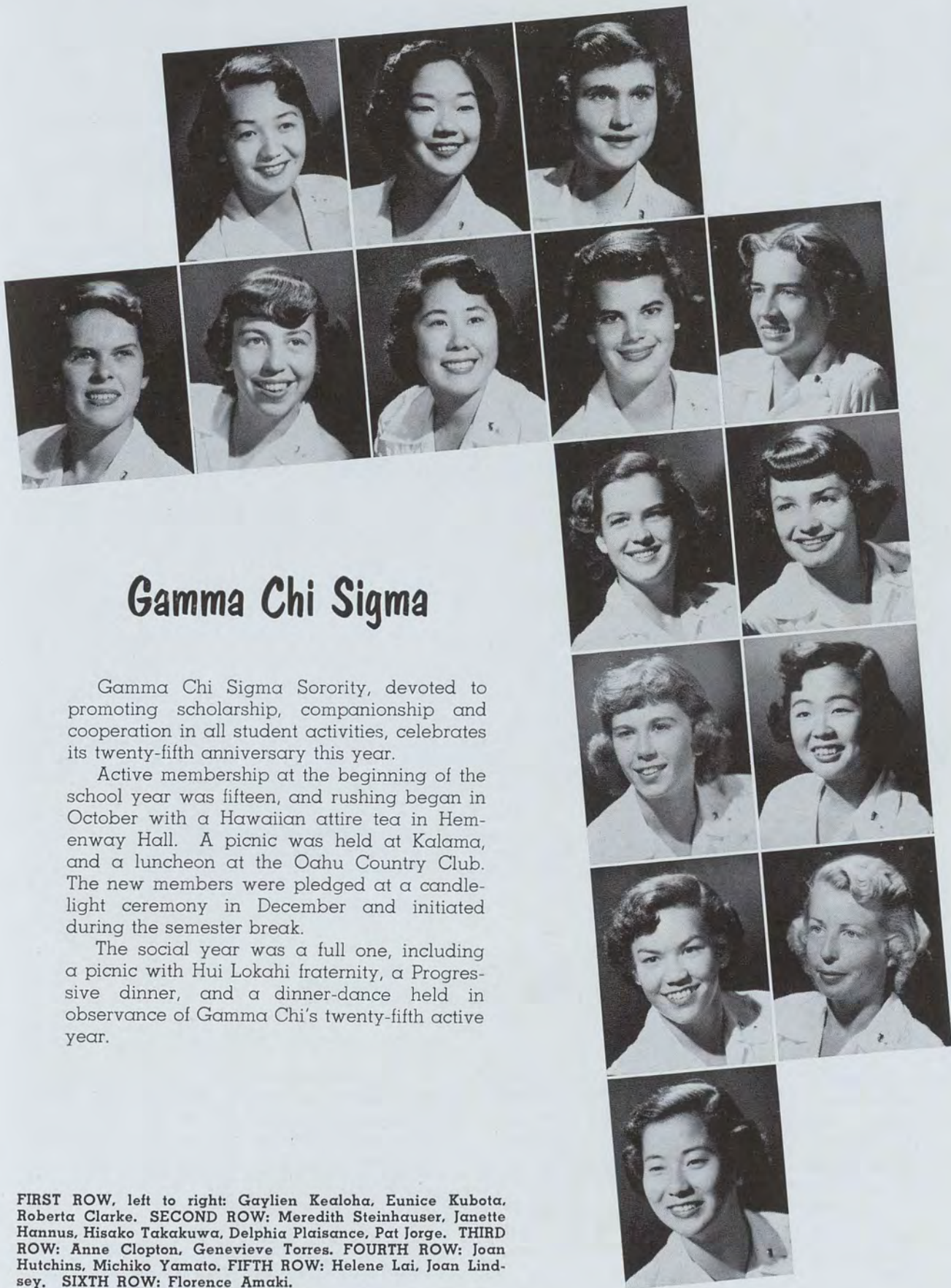

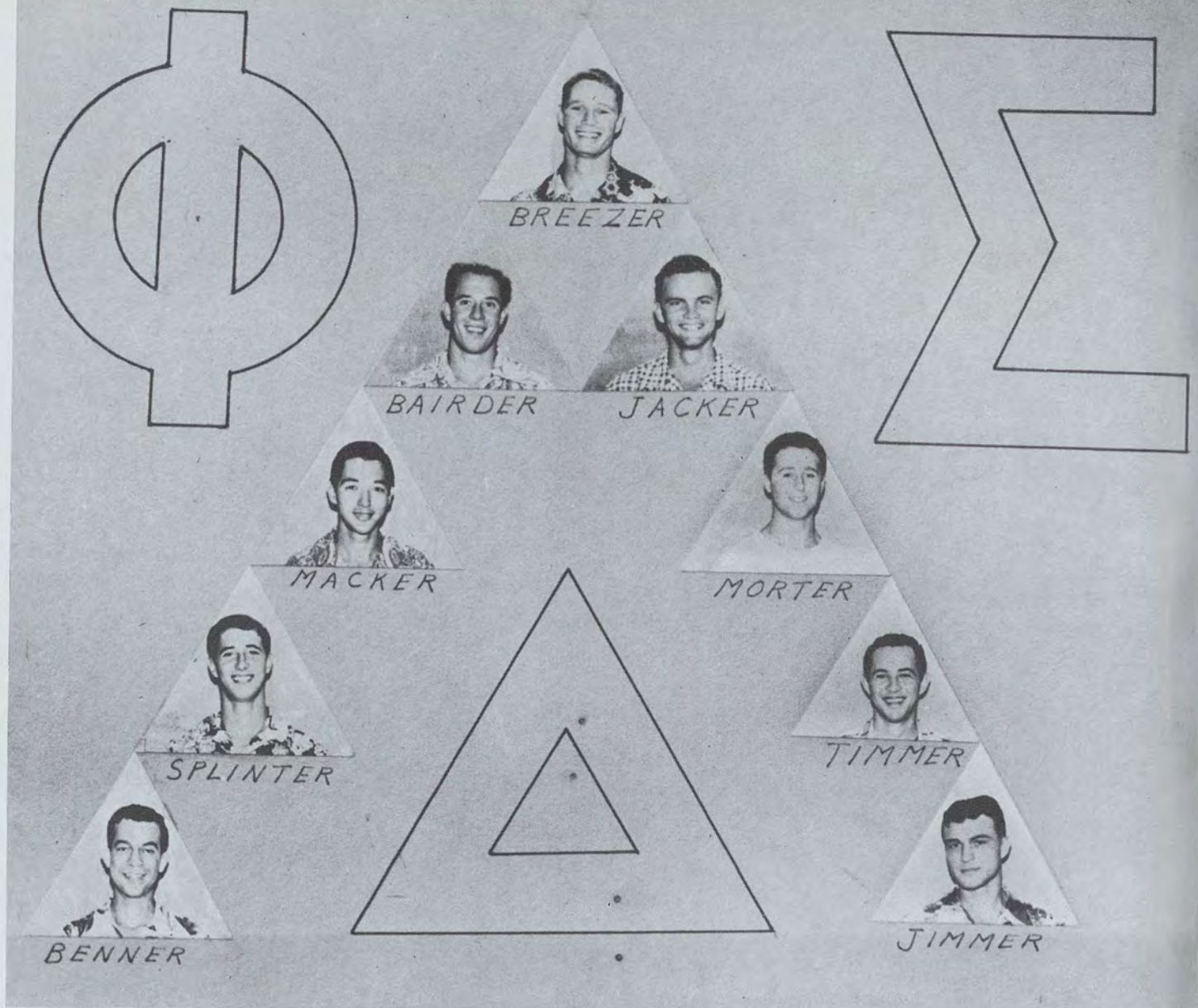
Gamma Chi Sigma
