*kalamunggay* (F) a tree with edible leaves and beans (*Moringa oleifera*)

*kālua* (H) to bake in the ground oven

kama (J) a pot in which to boil rice

kanten (J) agar-agar; Japanese gelatin

kappa (J) raincoat

kasu (J) by-product

katakana (J) square form of Japanese writing; angular Japanese syllabary used primarily for loanwords

kaukau (PI/HCE) food\*

kaukau tin (PI/HCE) tiered lunch pail\*

keahi (H) a native tree (Nesoluma polynesicum), with milky sap and oblong, alternate leaves -ken (J) prefecture

kenjinkai (J) an association of people from a prefecture

kiawe (H) algaroba tree

kikurage (J) cloud ear mushroom

kilawin (F) raw or half-cooked fish or meat seasoned with vinegar or lemon juice kimchi (K) spicy pickled vegetables kine (PI/HCE) type of kini (H) a child's best marble in the game koa (H) the largest of native forest trees

kochujang (K) red pepper paste

koge (J) scorch, burn; burnt ricekōlea (H) native species of trees and shrubs(Myrsine) with oval to narrow leaves, small flowers, and small round fruit.
