He has already secured a guarantee fund. The Philharmonic Society has now enrolled fifty-five members, and holds rehearsals every Thursday evening at 8 p. m. in Pauahi Hall, Punahou. In order to make the chorus as numerous and effective as possible Prof. Ballaseyus extends an invitation to all singers of Honolulu to join, and he can be reached Thursday evenings in Pauahi Hall.

PREACHER AGAIN SCORES CLUBWOMEN

Rev. W. E. Tanner Grills Them for Opposing Men Teachers in Berkeley Schools

Says Boys Under Female Rule Become Effeminate and Need Masculine Guidance

OAKLAND, Jan. 12.—That Berkeley clubwomen, even if backed by state and national federations of clubs, are waging a vain fight in the college town against the installation of more men teachers in the high school, was enunciated by Rev. Walter E. Tanner of the Baptist church of Melrose tonight. The pastor declared that the movement is national and that nothing can check it. Club interference with schools in any form was denounced in the same strong terms Tanner had previously used in attacking clubs, especially fashionable women's clubs, as enemies of the home. A letter from S. D. Waterman, superintendent of schools in Berkeley, was read from the pulpit in a symposium on the "Ideal Public School," in which the need of more men teachers, regardless of the protests of women's clubs, was emphasized, and other letters from high educational authorities throughout the country were adduced in support of the position. Waterman's letter read:

The wisdom of the action of the Berkeley board of education in announcing that all principals and vice principals of schools containing eight grades and over should be men can not be questioned. At least half the teachers in the high school should be high class men. Many children leave school before entering high school, and it is almost a crime to permit them to leave while having had their disciplinary and educational training entirely from women. Woman finds her true sphere of educational usefulness in grades from the first to the sixth. At least part of the training in the seventh and eighth grades should be given by men. Boys and girls above the seventh and eighth grades in the nature of things need training and guidance from manly men. There are branches of work in which men or women excel, exactly as there is a wide difference in their mental and intellectual being.

DEPLORES SMALL SALARIES

Waterman said the difficulty in securing high class men for high schools could be traced to the small salaries paid, and that the entire country was concerning itself over the problem of getting more men into such positions.

The clergyman withheld the name of a San Francisco educator who said that club or any other outside interference in public schools should be ignored and that only communications from individuals should be heeded:

Genuine co-operation between the home and the teacher would greatly benefit the public school system, but clubs and other societies should not be allowed to dominate or influence school authorities. Such a course is un-American, as we have always sought to isolate the schools from any influence outside of their immediate makeup. The action of the Berkeley club women will be fruitless, for even they can not deny that growing boys, rebelling at the idea of anything effeminate, invariably seek the companionship of men older than themselves, and engage for a time in active enmity with the feminine race. Then why should they not be supplied with the best of male companionship and guidance until, with the completion of rapid development, women can once again resume the sway held over the boy's mind in early childhood?

CALLS OPPOSITION USELESS

Opposition to this fundamental law is useless and senseless, and in no place more misdirected than in opposing men teachers in high school and the upper grammar grades. Our schools at present turn out an alarmingly high percentage of failures among boys, and the fault lies with the fact that a boy is jammed willy nilly into a feminine high school mold, and if he rebels he is broken and if he submits he is made effeminate. What else can be expected from our high school faculties as at present organized?

He is a successful teacher of both instrumental and vocal music and will devote some time to classes in both these branches while here. For three years Mr. Ballaseyus was choir director and organist of the Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago, for six years musical director of the State University of South Dakota, four years professor of music at the Hollins' Institute in Virginia, two years as organist in New York city, and three years musical director at Oahu College in Honolulu, where he organized and conducted the Philharmonic Society, which, under his direction, produced Hayden's "Creation" and Handel's "Messiah," with great success. More recently he appeared as solo-pianist in Steinway Hall, San Francisco, and in the Greek theater of the University of California.

Hereafter it will not be necessary to go to Sacramento or elsewhere to secure a musical instructor, for Placerville students. This city now has a competent teacher in the person of Mr. Franz A. Ballaseyus, whose card appears in today's "Nugget."

An Enjoyable Concert.

The concert given last Friday evening at the Methodist Church by Prof. F. A. Ballaseyus and the High School Choral was a high class entertainment and thoroughly appreciated by those present. Professor Ballaseyus gave further evidence of the fact that he is perfect master of the pipe organ, all of his solo work being given with fine effect and artistic finish. The choral work of the class was highly creditable, and the music selected of the kind to win appreciation from an audience of diversified tastes, including as it did both popular and classic. Leo Burger contributed two violin solos, "The Swan" and Handel's "Largo" which were both gems. The program throughout was a most enjoyable one, and another move toward the higher musical standard being firmly established by Placerville's musicians.

The Senior Play, a Finished and Artistic Production.

When it was announced a few weeks ago that the Seniors of the High School would produce Pygmalion and Galatea as their class play, the opinion was prevalent that they had undertaken more than they could carry out satisfactorily either to themselves or the public. But that this was an erroneous idea was fully demonstrated last Thursday evening by their really remarkable presentation of this beautiful Greek comedy, which was not only correctly and elegantly costumed, with a stage setting that would do credit to a much more pretentious play-house, but the various emotions as expressed by the different characters were depicted with such realism as to move the large audience present to spontaneous recognition of their ability.

Will Myers as Pygmalion gave a splendid conception of the character and further evidenced the fact that his talent is far-reaching, and that he is as much at home in the classic as in the modern drama. Not only was he almost absolutely letter-perfect in his lines, but, not for one brief moment did we see Will Myers, so completely did he live the part of the cultured Athenian sculptor.

Edwina Anderson as Galatea was the personification of pure innocence throughout, and, by all her natural grace of form and sweetness of character, was admirably adapted to the role assigned her. The audience were in sympathy with her from the first, which in itself is a tribute of praise. In many of the stronger scenes with Pygmalion she showed decided ability and in the prayer she offers on bended knee she touches all hearts.

Vera Lukens, who is also particularly endowed with histrionic ability, was at home in the role of Cynisca, Pygmalion's wife, and left nothing to be desired. When calling on the goddess Artemis to punish Pygmalion for his faithlessness, she reaches dramatic heights. Mattie Blair, as Myrine, Pygmalion's sister, was a dainty Grecian picture, and Nita Kyburz, as Daphne, the wife of Chrysos, enacted the veritable termagant. Stanley Arnot, as Chrysos the rich, but not too educated art patron, was clever, as he always is. Lee Cohn, as Leucippe, a soldier, and Lloyd Marsh and Raymond Perry, as slaves, all did creditable work.

Miss Myrtle Meyers occupied a prominent position as the statue of Galatea and was very necessary to the general illusion. She is entitled to special praise for a very successful representation, requiring as it did, heroic endurance. With her must be mentioned Miss Thomas of the Faculty, who carried out the design of the sculptor with the living model. And to Miss Ferrier, Miss Thomas, and Prof. Neighbor are the public indebted for one of the most finished productions ever seen in Placerville.

A breezy little "Curtain Raiser" entitled "Parted by Patience" included in the cast Alice Collins, who as Aunt Patience was inimitably funny, Gladys Bennett, Vera Lukens, George Lucas and Roy Etzel. It was a general mix-up of love affairs well-enacted, which all ended happily for all concerned.

Interspersing the program Prof. Ballaseyus gave two beautiful piano solos, and the High School orchestra played several numbers.
