FROM THE DIRECTOR

Placed against today's brand of street violence, the gang warfare in *West Side Story* is almost an anachronism. In the late 1950s, however, it was a fair representation of teenage life in many sections of urban America. As such, it startled and challenged capacity audiences throughout the country.

In 1959-60 I played Riff in a touring company of *West Side Story*.

It was one of my most exciting acting experiences, and directing it has given me a similar high. West Side Story leaves an indelible mark on all who are part of it. It is one of the most brilliantly successful Broadway and motion picture musical hits in theatrical history.

history.

Distinguished director-choreographer Jerome Robbins hit on the original idea in 1949 of a modern adaptation of *Romeo and Juliet*, set in the New York slums. His Juliet would be Jewish and his Romeo Catholic, and the family feud in the Shakespearean tragedy would arise from the coincidence of Easter-Passover celebrations.

Robbins approached Leonard Bernstein to handle the scoring; Bernstein was excited by the possibilities, but was extremely busy on

several lengthy major projects at the time. The project was shelved

for the next six years, until it was reactivated in 1955, at which time the Jewish-Catholic premise was discarded in favor of two teenage gangs—one of native New Yorkers and the other Puerto Rican. The original title, "East Side Story," was changed to its present one.

Another two years passed before *West Side Story* exploded into

being. Masterminded by Robbins, with music by Bernstein, lyrics by the then twenty-seven-year-old Stephen Sondheim who was making his Broadway debut, and book by Arthur Laurents, it had its first performance on August 20, 1957, in Washington, D.C. It then continued on to Philadelphia, and opened in New York on September 26, 1957. It drew ecstatic raves from all critics as an

The original Broadway run of *West Side Story*, while still going strong, was cut short at 732 performances because the producers felt New York theatre-goers would weary of it. As it turned out, their fears were groundless. The show went on the road for ten months of

standing room only performances and came back to New York in triumph for a return engagement in April of 1960.

electrifying and revolutionary new form of theatre.

West Side Story opened its London engagement to tremendous acclaim on December 12, I958. Seventeen of eighteen London drama critics enthusiastically voted it the best foreign musical of the 1958-59 season over My Fair Lady, which also had a sensational debut earlier that season. The movie version of West Side Story continued to reap the accolades, winning ten Oscars in the 1961

Academy Awards, including Best Picture.

Since its premiere, *West Side Story* has been seen on stages throughout the world, and continues to be one of the most popular American musicals of all time.

Adrienne J. H. Young (Libby-Jo) has been dancing most of her


life. She is a senior in Dance at UHM and has been in several dance concerts, though this is her first musical.
