

PIP FALL SEMESTER GRADUATES

Two PIP students will receive their M.A. degrees at the end of fall semester: Mr. CLAYTON HEE and Mr. JOHN PUGH. Mr. Hee plans to continue his graduate studies and has applied for admission to the Ph.D. program in geography. Mr. Pugh's graduate studies represent only a small part of his long involvement in the Pacific. Between 1938 and 1976, he served in over a dozen locales in the Pacific during his career in transportation and tourism.

FOLLOW-UP: JOHANNES SEMINAR

The PIP Seminar given by Dr. Robert E. Johannes, "Application of Traditional Knowledge and Practices of Pacific Islanders for Marine Resource Management," on November 29 was well received. Dr. Johannes' research has many implications for the use, conservation, and management of marine fauna. Seminar participants expressed interest in Johannes' publications that relate to his seminar presentation. Dr. Johannes has just completed a book length manuscript entitled Words of the Lagoon, and it has been submitted to a university press for consideration.

PIP COURSES - SPRING 1979

The Pacific Islands Studies Program offers the following courses/seminars for Spring Semester 1979:

- PIP 393 Change in the Pacific: Melanesia. 3 credits, 3:00-4:15 p.m., Tues. an Thurs. Probable instructor: Dr. Michael Hamnett. The course focuses upon Melanesian societies and cultures at the time of European contac and the subsequent impact of explorers, colonial administrations, missionaries, blackbirders, labor recruiters, multi-national corporations, and contemporary political movements. A complete syllabus and list of reading assignments are available from the PIP office.
- PIP 690 Graduate Seminar: Change in the Pacific. 3 credits, 1:30-4:00 p.m., Monday. Instructor: Dr. Robert C. Kiste. The seminar focuses upon the process of decolonialization in the contemporary insular Pacific region. The political and economic structures of Pacific countries and territories are examined and compared. Attention is given to regional organizations such as the South Pacific Commission and the South Pacific Forum. Seminar speakers will include a number of Pacific Islanders. SENIOR SEMINAR: HAWAIIAN STUDIES SPRING 1979

Hawaiian Studies 490, Senior Seminar in Hawaiian Studies is offered for the first time, Spring Semester, 1979. Instructor: Abraham Piianaia. Participants are encouraged to integrate their previous knowledge and experience in Hawaiian Studies by conducting an individual or task group project pertinent to intellectual and community concerns over the past, present, and future of Hawaii. Emphasis is placed upon key issues in traditional and contemporary Hawaii. Participants examine the methodologies employed in research projects reported upon by guest speakers.

The seminar is primarily an "exit forum" for graduating seniors in Hawaiian Studies. Other students may, however, participate in the seminar with the consent of the instructor. PIP students with a background and interest in Hawaii may include the seminar in their M.A. program with the consent of both their advisor and Professor Piianaia. Peaces at will be off the air from December 20, 1978 to January 27, 1979 due to technical tests and the summer vacation period for those countries south of the equator.
