in Cataloging Books

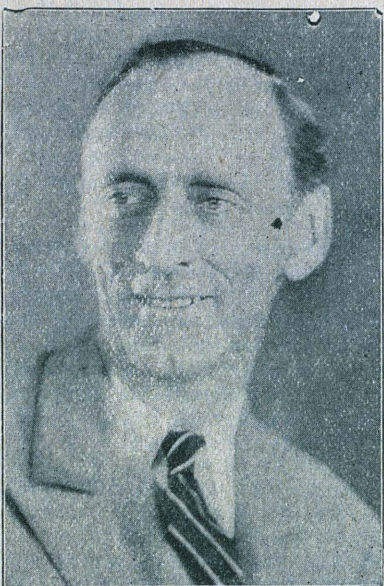
Dr. Taam Cheuk-woon, former librarian and dean of Lingnan university, Canton, arrived to join the staff of the Oriental Institute at the University of Hawaii. He will spend a year helping to catalog the Japanese and Chinese books of the institute.

Dr. Taam is author of "The Development of Chinese Libraries Under the Ching Dynasty." He is also the compiler of the best "Reader's Guide to Chinese Periodical Literature," a reference book of recognized standards.

Besides being editor of the Lingnan Journal for some time, Dr. Taam was also director of studies at Lingnan, succeeding Dr. Wing Tsit Chan.

Dr. Taam received his A.B. degree from Lingnan in 1922, a B.L.S. degree from Columbia university in 1931, and a Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago in 1933.

I gave him a grudging peck on the schnozzle. He wasn't satisfied. "C'mon now," he bullied. "A great big one."

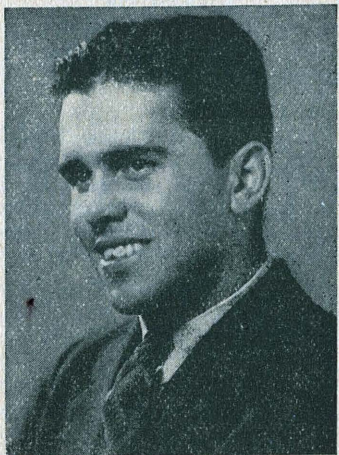

Ground Plays Denver's Forte

Employing a slight variation of the Gil Dobie-unbalanced line system, Bill Saunders' lads are sure to stage a great exhibition of pigskin handling. Saunders, who played under Dobie at Annapolis, installed the latter's brand of football at Denver last year when he replaced Percy Loecey.

Smashing off tackle plays and wide end sweeps feature Denver's unbalanced line offensive. The Pioneers should keep the Dean tackles and ends busy throughout the skirmish.

The Pioneers' offensive, which does not rely on an above ground game, will have as its main weapon a ground offense with flashy Orlando Maio bearing the brunt of the attack.

Despite the fact that Saunders' system calls for emphasis on ground plays, it would not be surprising if Denver should heave the oval on many occasions. Blocking half Herb McCarthy and Ferd Dreher should figure prominently in the Pioneers' aerial circus.

The Denver line, which has the advantage of both height and weight over the Manoaans, should prove troublesome to the Dean forward wall.

Dreher, John Woudenberg and Fred Powers, sophomore end, will undoubtedly turn in outstanding performances tomorrow.

"The Future of Democracy in a World of Conflict." This is the topic for the first of the monthly adult forums to be sponsored by the Adult Education Division of the Central YMCA, under the direction of Lawrence Norrie, at Cooke hall 7:30 tonight.

Library Window thinks that there is possibly no other topic which would be of more interest to students at the University. From time to time we hear eminent statesmen declaring that the next war, if and when it comes, will be fought not with nations as foes but with different political creeds as opponents.

With most of Europe and Asia witnessing a fight for supremacy by fascism and communism, the United States and England seem to be the only great powers that are the home of democracy of any degree.

In such a crisis of international relations, democracy seems to be taking a back seat, fearful lest the struggle leave them not a democracy but a dictatorship. The world has witnessed, since the World War, how democracy has fared. Germany's Weimar Republic ended in the National Socialist dictatorship of Adolph Hitler. Italy's fate is now in the hands of one, Benito Mussolini. Russia is experimenting in what she calls the true democracy but what other nations call a despotic dictatorship. Japan's attempt at some degree of democracy under the constitution formulated by Prince Ito has ended in what nations call fascism. China's Republic is being turned into a puppet state under the "guiding hands" of Japan. In such a crisis, where do we, of the United States of America, stand.

Obviously the topic won't be exhausted in a night's discussion. It will be present as long as a democracy and a world of conflict are existent.

However, the main speaker of the evening, Dr. Clyde Miller, eminent propaganda analyst, and the panel composed of Dr. Joe

Reinecke, Dr. Miles Carey, Mr. Fred Loper, and others can throw some light to questions which have troubled those who have thought about the future of democracy in a world of conflict.

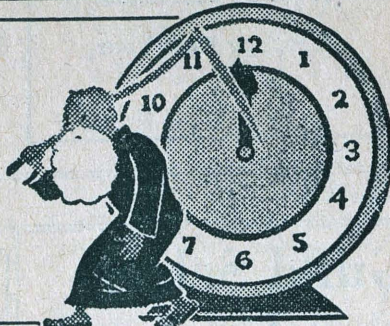

"This does not prove, however, that ambition is unhealthy in itself," Dr. Stannard asserted. "I am certain that Dr. Vinson does not imply that one should not have any ambition. What he does mean is that an individual's ambition should be aimed at a reasonably attainable goal rather than at a goal adapted from someone else's ideas of what he should be."

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (ACP)—We are more inclined to waste brains than we are to waste money! At least that is the claim made by Dr. William Mather Lewis, president of Lafayette University, to the Philadelphia Alumni Association.

"We scrap the best mental power of the country at the moment it has most to offer. Colleges retire administrative officials and professors at the time when they are at the height of their intellectual effectiveness."

"A college organization second to none could be created by using men now being put on the retired lists of various institutions. The outstanding intellects of America today are Chief Justice Hughes, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, Pres. James Rowland Angell, Senator Borah, Mr. Justice Brandeis, Hon. 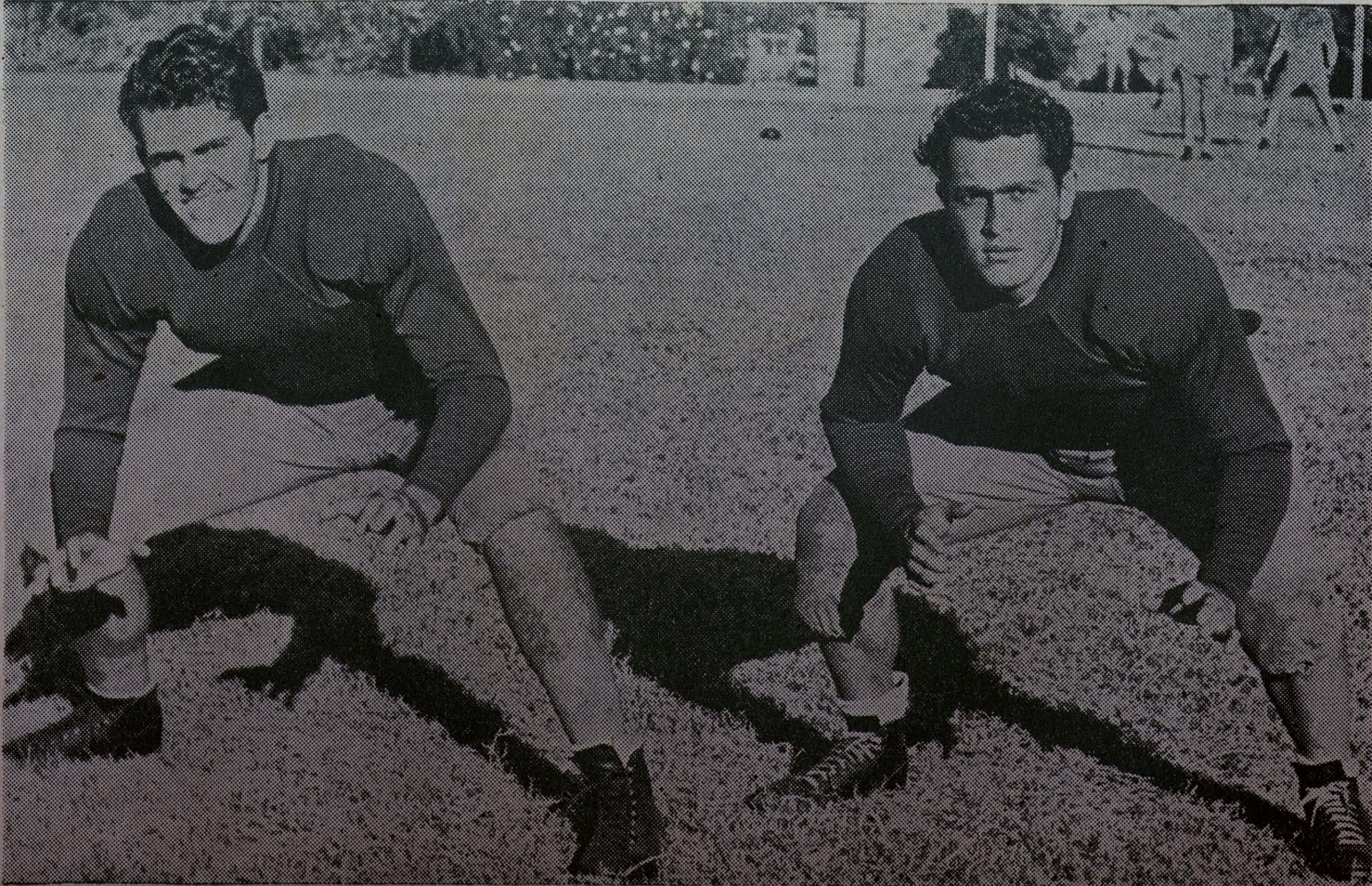
