Conclusions

Teacher candidates grow into successful teachers by establishing and maintaining dispositions that reflect the norms of the profession.

Dispositions are “tendencies for individuals to act in a particular manner under particular circumstances, based on their beliefs,” (Villegas, 2007, p. 373)

Candidates demonstrate values and behaviors in all aspects of their professional lives, including: UHM classes, field-based courses, public settings, private settings, face-to-face interactions and online interactions.



Introduction- NHPoL in Teacher Education


SY2023-2024 transitions the UHM COE Teacher Education Program to become a School for Teacher Education (STE). Common assessments across programs are currently under review.

Pilina: *relationship, connection*

Example Item

Teacher candidates **communicate** effectively, cultivating and maintaining relationships. They make connections across modalities, with a range of university and school partners (CDF 4c, 4f).

This tool was developed by representatives from all teacher preparation programs at UH Mānoa, College of Education, to advance our commitment to being a Native Hawaiian place of learning and to reflect the values of our island home. It has been informed by the Charlotte Danielson Framework (Domain 4), and Nā Hopena ‘Ao.

- The revised Professional Disposition form is being piloted in Spring 2024 semester.
- Feedback will be collected and analyzed and shared with faculty.
- Modifications will be made (if needed) and the new assessment form will be implemented starting Fall 2024.
