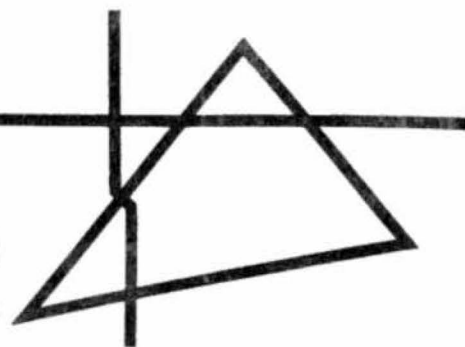

SUMMER GRADUATE SEMINAR
FOR TEACHERS

PIP 690 Graduate Seminar, Change in the Pacific, 3 credits, is being offered during the summer and the focus will be upon meeting the needs of teachers who are interested in learning more about the Pacific. The seminar is not, however, limited to teachers, and the instructor will be Dr. CARL DAEUFER. Teachers will be asked to help define their own needs with regard to instruction about the Pacific. Attention will be devoted to identifying appropriate teaching materials; developing new materials, and delineating and evaluating teaching strategies on the Pacific for social studies, history, and other relevant areas. Dr. Daeufer will be drawing upon a number of specialists in the Pacific area, and they will appear as guest lecturers and resource persons.

The seminar is scheduled to coincide with the end of the DOE academic year, and it will be offered during the last 3 weeks of the 1st summer session and first 3 weeks of the 2nd summer session. The dates are June 16-July 25. The seminar meets daily 10:10 to 11:25 a.m., Keller Hall 314.

The Graduate School of Library Studies and Pacific Islands Studies are offering a workshop on Pacific Islands Resource Materials, July 28 - August 14. The workshop is chaired by Dr. MILES JACKSON and will meet from 9:00 a.m. to 11:40 a.m. Monday through Friday at the Graduate School of Library Studies, University of Hawaii at Manoa, Hamilton Library. The workshop is intended for school librarians, teachers, students and others working with or interested in Pacific Islands Studies.

The workshop will include coverage of Pacific Islands bibliography and publishing, discussions led by specialists on aspects of Pacific Islands history and culture, field trips to the Bishop Museum and Polynesian Culture Center, opportunities to pursue individual projects.

LUNCHEON SPEAKER

On Tuesday, May 13, Mr. WILLIAM BODDE, Jr., Director, Office of Pacific Islands Affairs, U.S. Department of State spoke at a luncheon at the Kahala Hilton. Bodde's topic was "The South Pacific: U.S. Policy in the 1980's." The luncheon was cosponsored by the Pacific Islands Studies Program, Pacific and Asian Affairs Council, and Hawaii International Services Agency. The luncheon attracted over 100 people.

PAAC REPORT

The following items have been submitted by Ms. KAREN KNUDSEN, Outreach Coordinator, Pacific and Asian Affairs Council (PAAC).

PAAC's Annual Year End Student Planning Conference will be held at the University of Hawaii-Manoa, June 6-8, 1980. This year's theme will be "The Emerging Pacific: A new Era of East-West Exchange," and will focus on the Pacific Islands, their peoples and cultures. Activities will include an introduction to Micronesia, a slide show on the results of nuclear testing on Enewetak by FLOYD TAKEUCHI, writer for the Advertiser's Editorial Page, a trip to the Bishop Museum and cultural demonstrations and discussions by Pacific Islanders.

Ms. ALIDA LABRIE, Director of the Truk Student Services in Hawaii and Mr. DANNY RESCUE, Assistant Director, have met with Outreach Coordinator Karen Knudsen to discuss strategies and resource materials for working with high school students. Trukese students are now making classroom presentations on Micronesia with an emphasis on Truk. The Trukese Students will also be participating in PAAC's Year End Conference on June 7, 1980.

"Comparing School Life and Education in the Pacific" was the topic of the second PEACESAT Exchange between students from Hawaii, Papua New Guinea, New Zealand, the Cook Islands and Niue held on Sunday, April 13, 1980. The session, hosted by Hawaii students from Wai-pahu High School, Sacred Hearts Academy, Star of the Sea, Castle High School and Mid-Pacific Institute discussed what subjects are popular in school, which sports are popular among students and what lies ahead for students following graduation.

The third session, "Comparing Lifestyles," was hosted by students from Wellington, New Zealand. The students discussed how various institutions and programs are helping to preserve the cultures of the islands. They also discussed modern and traditional marriage customs and dating.

The exchanges have generated a lot of enthusiasm and the students have asked to continue PEACESAT throughout the summer.
