Patricia Grace visits the university

Influential New Zealand writer Patricia Grace visited the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa last week. Grace read from her novels "Tu" and "Baby No-Eyes" Wednesday evening and participated in the panel discussion "Indigenizing the Novel in Aotearoa: The Role of Culture and Identity" on Thursday.

"When you write about the ordinary lives of people, you can't avoid issues of power in the country and in the rest of the world ... I'll continue to write about the lives of ordinary people, and if politics come out, so be it," Grace said.

Patricia Grace was born on ancestral land in Wellington, where she continues to live. She started writing when she was about 25, while working as a primary school teacher. Her work, which is widely recognized as technically excellent and insightful, is about "the ordinary world of ordinary people." Political themes of land, language and power intrinsic to Maori life are

necessarily woven into her stories.

Grace was initially inspired by Hone Tuwhare, the first published Maori writer in English, who wrote about ordinary lives of Maori people in his 1964 novel "No Ordinary Sun." Grace, the first published female Maori writer in English, said of herself and her colleague, UHM professor Albert Wendt, "We saw what [Tuwhare] was doing and said, 'Hey, we can do that, too.'" Grace's contributions to Pacific literature, for which she has earned numerous awards, include the novels "Mutuwhenua," "Potiki," "Cousins," and "Dogside Story," as well as short story collections and children's books. "Patricia Grace has published six novels since the 1970s and continues in being a major influence in the indigenous novel internationally," Wendt said.

Grace is known for lush descriptions of her native characters' perceptions and her distinctly Polynesian, non-linear story weaving. Grace explained her narrative technique by giving an anecdote from her youth. "In school, we had to write an outline and then an

essay. I always wrote the essays first and always got five out of five points for the outlines, which I filled in afterwards. It is a natural way for me to write. Maybe the spiral is embedded in all our lives. I pull all the material to the center, sort it and weave backward and forward."

Grace's advice to beginning writers, including aspiring authors of Pacific literature is, "just do it." She said with a laugh that her writing developed through hard work, adding that she always "looks to develop wider themes, interesting ways of representing things, and new ways to say things." According to Grace, writing is a process of getting to know one's self. "In order to find our own ways of writing, we need to know who we are and have confidence," she said. "We have to know we're in the world and that the world is not something 'out there.'"

"Everything influences your writing. All experiences, everything you read, family stories, what people tell you, are all influential on writing." For Grace, it's just a matter of centering it all and weaving a story from the pieces.

Interim president to decide on UARC

University of Hawai'i Interim President David McClain will announce his decision on the proposed Navy research center at the next Board of Regents meeting this Thursday, beginning at 9 a.m. at Honolulu Community College. The board's agenda lists McClain's decision as the "recommendation concerning the University Affiliated Research Center," according to a story that appeared in the Honolulu Star-Bulletin yesterday.

The heated debate surrounding the UARC has divided the UH community in recent months. Proponents say the center would improve Hawai'i's science industry and raise money for

the university, while opponents say the multi-million dollar center would advance classified research and the militarization of Hawai'i.

The faculty senate of University of Hawai'i at Mānoa voted 31-18 against the UARC last November. At least two other UH campuses joined UHM in opposition of the research center. The Honolulu Community College faculty senate voted 21-1 in favor of the UHM Senate resolution opposing the UARC. The University of Hawai'i at Hilo faculty senate also supports the resolution.

Other universities in the nation with Navy-funded research centers include University of Washington, Pennsylvania State University, Johns Hopkins University and University of Texas at Austin.

UH jumps to 33rd after review of national study

The University of Hawai'i has risen to no. 33 in the nation in terms of college efficiency in a revised study of national colleges that originally ranked UH second to last. Researchers of the study, funded by the Pew Charitable Trusts, reviewed their study results at the behest of UH Interim President David McClain, the Star-Bulletin reported last week.

Authors of the study, who work for the National Center for Higher Education Management Systems, said \$100 million in fringe benefits for UH employees was double-counted when figuring in the cost of higher education. Additionally, a lower cost of living estimate was used for Hawai'i at an estimated 16 percent above the 51 percent average.

Roving chlamydia: LGV upsurge

A rare strain of chlamydia, which has caused an outbreak in Europe, is slowly spreading in the United States. Lymphogranuloma venereum is a particularly damaging sexually transmitted disease that is sometimes mistakenly diagnosed as irritable bowel syndrome. Symptoms may include lymph node

swelling in the groin, fever, headache, chills and skin ulcers on the genitalia. However, some people may not exhibit any symptoms. LGV is treatable with a three-week course of doxycycline. Although anyone sexually active can contract this disease, the recent outbreak has been prevalent among

gay and bisexual men. Camaron Miyamoto, coordinator of the Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender Student Services Office, cautions that no one is exempt from this disease. “No matter who you sleep with, it’s important to have safer sex,” Miyamoto said.

Psychics find love in the cards

With the invasion of red roses and heart-shaped candies flooding stores everywhere, it can be difficult to ignore the existence of Valentine's Day — especially for a single person. "If you don't like where the road is going, it's your responsibility to change direction," Stockton said.

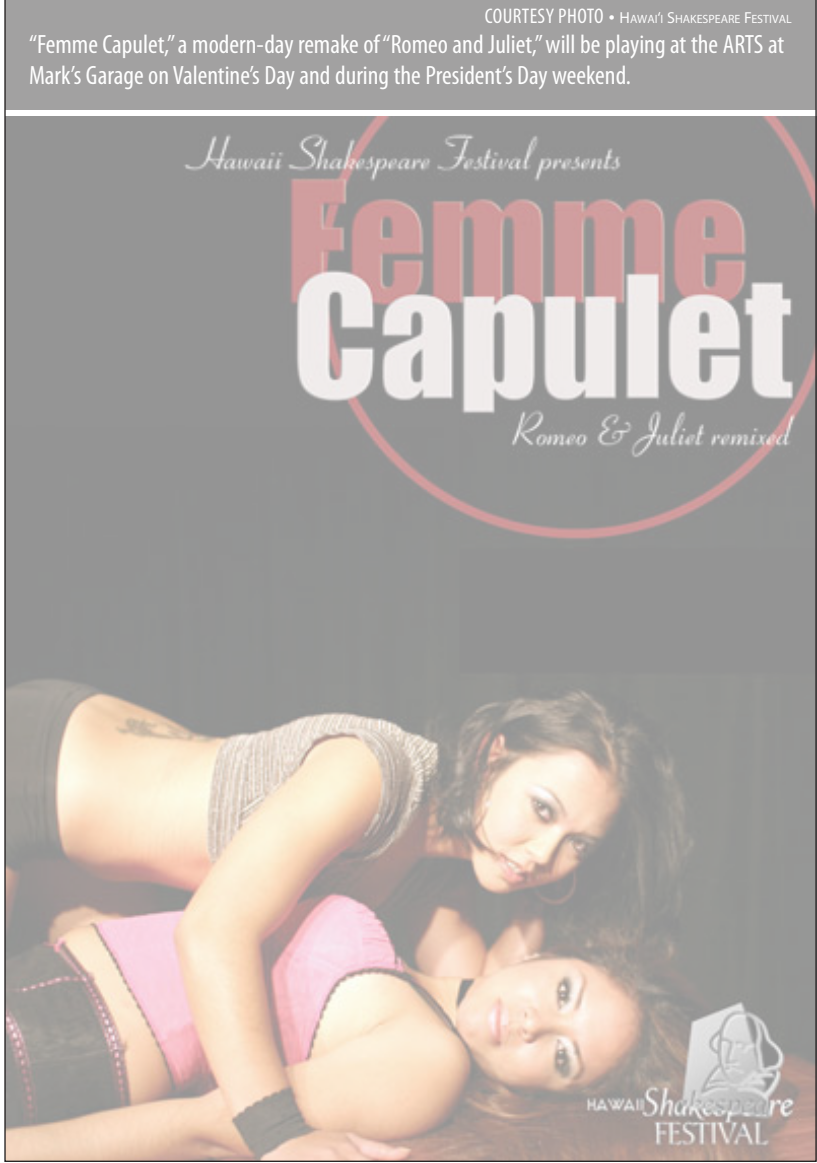

Play remixes classic Shakespeare tragedy

The Hawai'i Shakespeare Festival is presenting a daring off-season production. In the summer HSF usually performs traditional Shakespeare plays. This month, directors Troy M. Apostol and Shen Nissan Sugai have refashioned the tragic "Romeo and Juliet" love story into "Femme Capulet – Romeo and Juliet Remixed."

In "Femme Capulet," the story is told backwards, with the lovers' death scene first. The last scene then ends with the tender occasion of Romeo and Juliet's first kiss. Instead of being set in Verona, the plot will revolve around the "Femme Capulet" strip club. Although Shakespeare's original language will be used, some scenes have been cut out to accommodate for time.

The fights have been choreographed by Tony Pisculli, who is also the producer. Modern weaponry will be utilized, such as butterfly knives in lieu of swords. The dances were choreographed by Andy Valencia and are rumored to be very explicit. As Femme Capulet is a strip club, one can imagine what that means. Interestingly, Mercutio is played by a woman, Marissa Robello. She sets off a dance at the club, and half a dozen girls join in.

Producer Tony Pisculli commented on his involvement in the play: "I thought this was the most exciting adaptation of Romeo and Juliet since Baz Luhrman's 'Romeo and Juliet.'"

Pisculli said he had been awed by the movie, and noted that even though it was set in a futuristic mode compared to Shakespeare's, audiences were still moved by it. He is hoping that HSF's exciting original version of Romeo and Juliet will make a memorable impression as well.

There will be a special showing of Femme Capulet at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Feb. 14. During this Valentine's Day show, prizes from Sensually Yours will be given away and audience members will be able to receive back rubs from the dancers.

Three other shows are also scheduled for Friday, Feb. 17, Saturday, Feb. 18, and Sunday Feb. 19. They will all start at 8 p.m. There will also be a pre-show of sorts with the Femme Capulet "club" opening at 7:30 p.m. During that time, the cast will be accepting "tips." Pisculli invites audience members to keep some dollar bills handy.

"If they bring some singles, they may have the opportunity to use them," he said.

Femme Capulet will be playing at the ARTS at Marks Garage at 1159 Nu'uanu Ave. Parking is available at Marks Garage for five dollars or the underground municipal parking lot for three dollars. There may also be street parking. General tickets are sold for \$12, while students with an ID are \$10. Tickets can be purchased at the door or through the Honolulu Box Office at 550- 8457. Steps to making a Beer Rose

2. Make an origami rose. Visit <http://www.opane.com/opane/rose.html> for instructions. Origami allows a great deal of creative options. The paper itself can be easily customized by printing a photo collage or encrypting a puzzle. This is fun, interactive and rewarding.

3. Create a message in a ribbon. You need two equally long pieces of clear scotch tape long enough to wrap around the beer and rose and tie a bow. Take a piece of white paper and cut or tear a long piece. Make sure the paper is a little narrower than the tape. When you have crafted your message on the paper, adhere it to the center of

the tape and then cover it with the other piece of tape. This will create a lamination around your message. Tie the tape-ribbon into a bow.

Be creative. Here are some thoughtful variations that I hope will inspire you in some way:

- If you want to be anonymous, you can lift ink off the newspaper to create your message. Keep your tape wound so you have a small section of the tape to work with at a time. Press the scotch tape over the letter you wish to use. You may need to use your nails to scratch the tape and firmly adhere it to the letters. Now carefully lift the tape off the page and you will be on your way to sending an anonymous message.

- If alcoholic beverages won't work for you, use the person's favorite drink. Pour it into a glass jar and seal it.

- If you're feeling really good about the idea, consider a beer garden; use two six-packs and a dozen roses.

‘Darklight:’ music for the morbid romantic

Even the dark, broody person needs love this Valentine’s Day. Music from H.I.M.’s album “Darklight” may be a possible gift idea for that person.

H.I.M., which stands for “His Imperial Majesty” is a Finnish band made up of lead singer Valo (or Ville, according to their Web site), Gas on drums, Burton on keyboards, Linde on lead guitar, and Mige on bass.

“Darklight” is the band’s latest release. With song titles like “Vampire Heart,” “Killing Loneliness,” and “In the Nightside

of Eden,” one might expect a morbid tone and maybe a little screaming. You wouldn’t find it here. The tone of the entire album is solemn and a little sad, but somewhere in the combination of the music, lyrics and Valo’s singing, the mood of the album isn’t as serious as it might be.

If you’re the type to fall asleep while listening to music, this might be a good album. The songs flow well from one to the next, and there are no harsh moments of screaming or particularly sudden and loud guitar solos. The songs are almost ballad-like because of the melodies. This effect is soothing, which makes it nice to nap to, but can also come across as boring.

According to one fan-site, “Funeral of Hearts,” H.I.M. plays a style of music called “love metal.” The label is appropriate, since all the songs seem to be about love, and often the loss of it.

Occasionally the band utilizes clichéd imagery like the “winter of

my heart,” but more often they make interesting combinations of images, ending up with lines like, “Memories sharp as daggers pierce into the flesh of today;” or “A moth into a butterfly and a lie into the sweetest truth.”

H.I.M. also uses Christian references, such as the devil, bearing a cross, Eden, and whining “unholy” or “we offer as sacrifice” in more than one song. The references don’t detract from the “goth” feel of the album — their sparing placement throughout the album adds to the mood of “Darklight.”

“The Wings of a Butterfly,” their recent single, seems to be about showing one’s love through sacrifice. The title must be symbolic of this, because there is no other reference to butterflies throughout the rest of the song. Instead, it contains many of these religious references, although it doesn’t sound like a religious song. It’s catchy, but that is partly because it becomes repetitive near the end of the song.

The lyrics are the hardest thing to accept when it comes to this album. Lines such as, “Love me like you loved the sun scorching the blood in my Vampire Heart,” with a pause before “vampire,” comes across as the band trying too hard to use a phrase that would appeal to fans. The effect, however, is that the lyrics are forced, which conflicts with the rolling melodies and tune.

The fact that “Vampire Heart” is the first song on the album and the last minute of it is a drawn out repeating of the song’s refrain is another less-than-desirable point, but wouldn’t be noticed unless someone was listening for it.

Overall, the album is okay. The tunes are good, and the lyrics, while a little clichéd, are pretty.

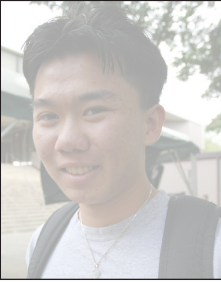

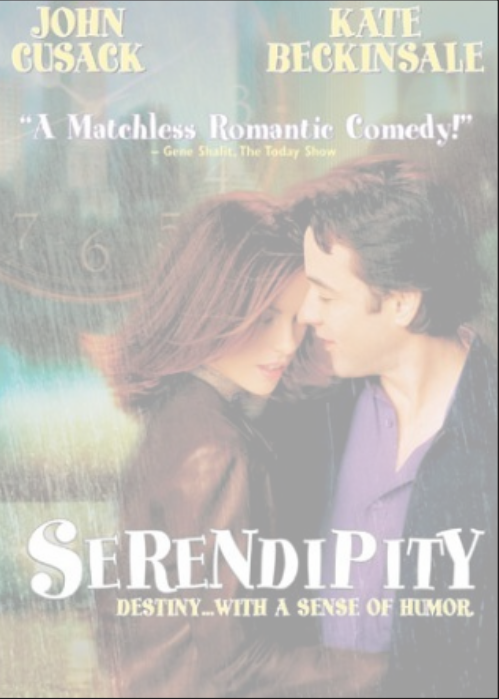

Movies to play on Valentine's Day

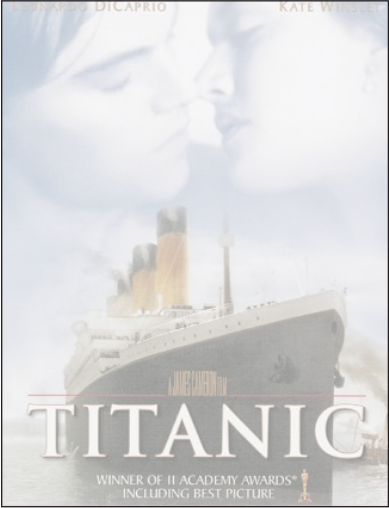

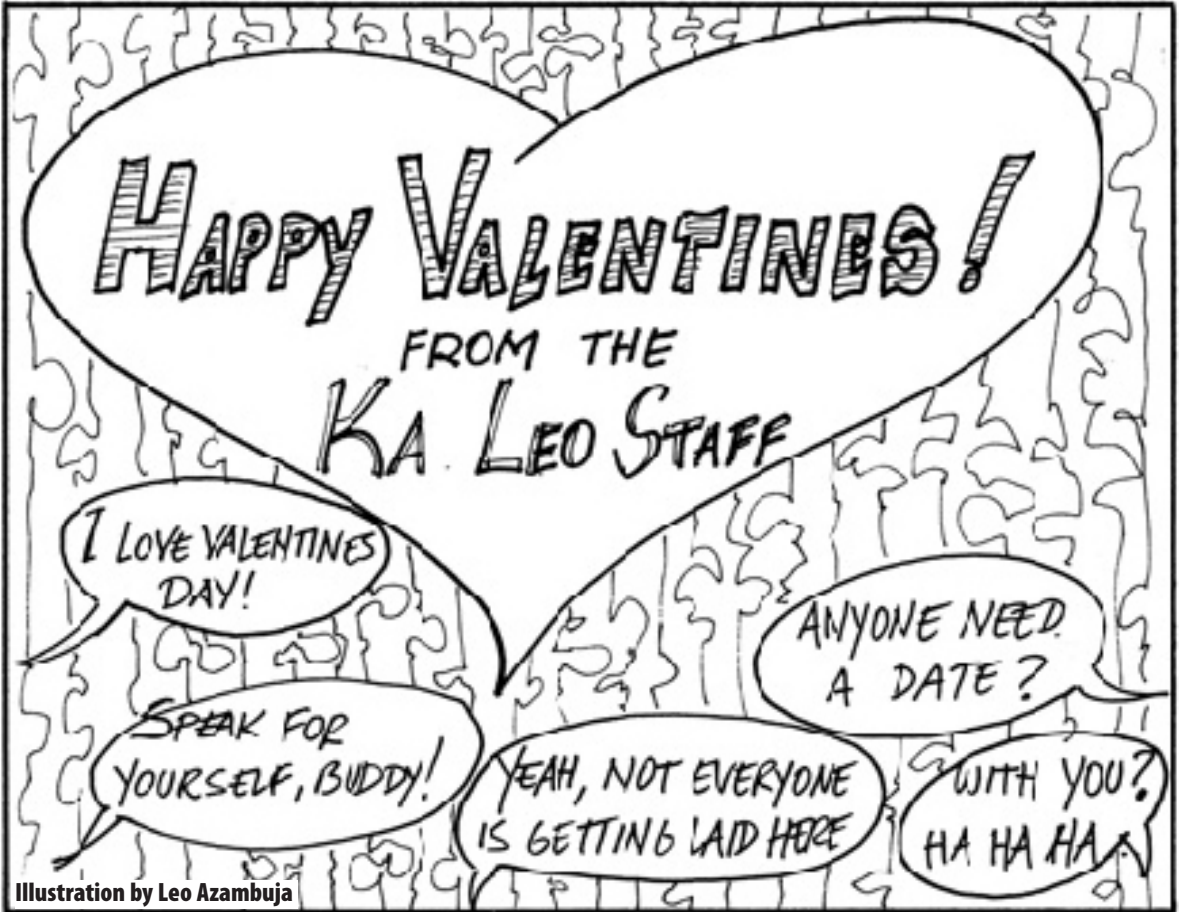
could make their day better.

The University of Hawai'i men's baseball team won its second straight non-conference series this past weekend against the University of California, Irvine Anteaters. The Rainbows improved to 5-2 and are set to take on the Hawai'i Pacific University Sea Warriors tonight at Les Murkami Stadium. First pitch is set for 6:35 p.m.

With the series tied at one game each, the Rainbows took advantage of the Anteater's miscues and added clutch relief pitching to win the game 3-1. UH southpaw pitcher Mark Rodrigues, in his second career start, tossed seven shutout innings, allowing only two hits and striking out two. He cruised through the UCI lineup, throwing 73 pitches, to earn his first win in a Rainbow uniform.

"You couldn't ask for a better outing to get his first win for us," UH Head Coach Mike Trapasso said.

Trapasso told his players that taking the three game set from UCI is a significant accomplishment.

"We won the series against a very good club, something that you can be proud of," Trapasso recounted telling his team after Sunday's win. In the week leading up to the series, Trapasso noted to the Ka Leo that he felt UCI was one of the best teams on the west coast.

Rodrigues' teammates provided all the run support he needed in the bottom of the first inning. With one out, UH left fielder Robbie Wilder smacked a double down the third base line. The next batter, UH third basemen Jon Hee, advanced Wilder to third on a ground out to first. Then Rainbow first basemen Luis Avila drove in Wilder with a single to left. Avila went 3 for 4 in the game and ended the three-game series hitting 3 of 10, with a run batted in.

At one point, Rodrigues stymied the Anteater lineup, retiring them in the fourth, fifth, and sixth innings.

In the bottom of the sixth, UH added two insurance runs to increase its lead to 3-0. After Hee advanced bases on an error by first basemen Cody Cipriano, designated hitter Justin Frash crushed a triple to right field to send in Hee. Frash recorded two hits in three at bats and tallied three hits in nine at bats for the series.

Hee's grounder was hit directly to Cipriano, but as he tried to throw the ball to UCI reliever Chris Lopez, the ball got stuck in his glove. Cipriano decided to throw his glove to Lopez at first, but the ball bounced out as Lopez received the mitt and Hee was called safe.

Another error in the inning allowed Frash to score from third. Both those unearned runs gave UH the momentum to hold off an Anteater comeback in the ninth inning.

Rainbow junior reliever Darrell Fisherbaugh struck out two Anteaters on his way to shutting them down in the eighth inning. However, in the ninth inning, Fisherbaugh walked UCI centerfielder and third basemen, Tyler Holiday, on four straight pitches and hit second basemen Ben Orloff on a full count delivery.

Fisherbaugh's woes in the ninth prompted Trapasso to call in Rainbow junior reliever Rich Olsen to try to salvage the inning and preserve UH's lead. Olsen allowed a sacrifice fly to bring in Holiday but ended any Anteater comeback on three fly-ball outs. Olsen's efforts earned him his first save of the year.

UH outfielder Matt Inouye went 5-for-5, including the game-winning RBI-single in the bottom of the ninth, to lead the University of Hawai'i Rainbow baseball team (4-1) past UC Irvine (3-2) 4-3 in front of a crowd of 2,449 at the Les Murakami Stadium Friday.

Fisherbaugh pitched two hitless innings with no hits and three strikeouts to get the win while Dylan Axelrod took the loss.

Hawai'i got on the board in the bottom of the first as Hee and Frash both scored on wild pitches. Inouye then singled in Hee in the third to put the Rainbow lead to 3-0. UH starter Steven Wright held the Anteaters for most of the game, allowing just one run in the fourth. Wright went 7.0 innings, giving up just two hits with four strikeouts and left the game with a 3-1 lead.

But UCI was able to get to the UH bullpen, scoring two runs in the eighth inning to tie the score at three. And the

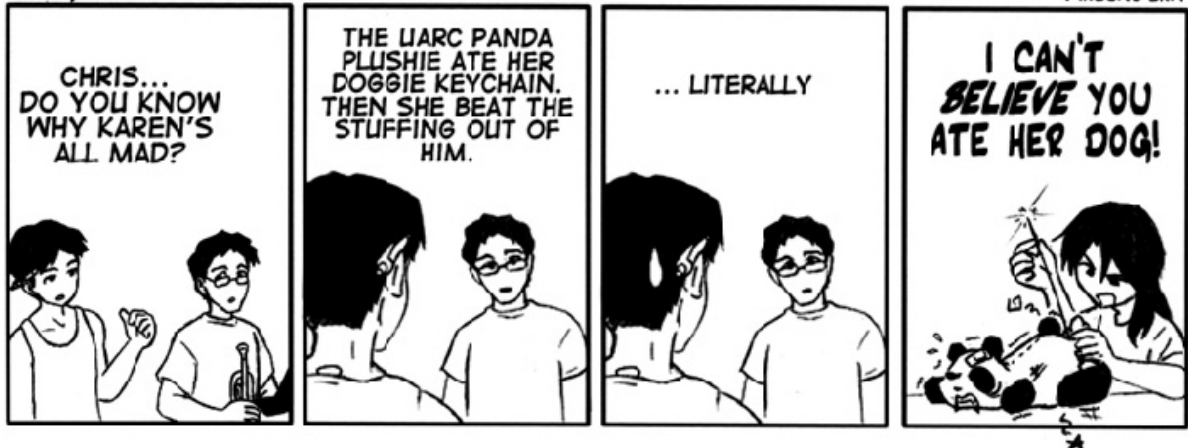

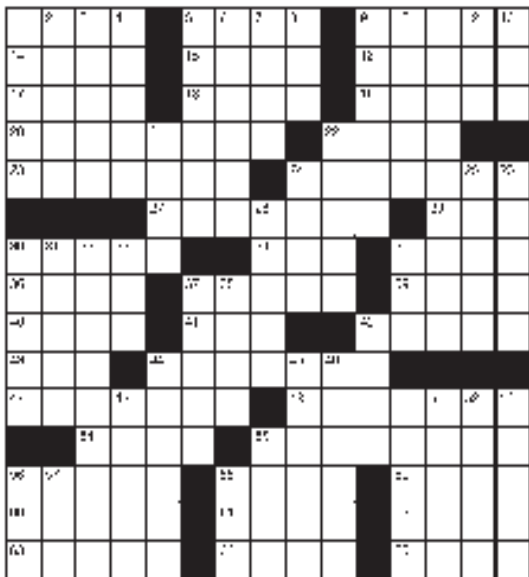

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UH softball off to a hot start

University of Hawai'i Rainbow Wahine Softball Stadium was a quiet place the last few months, but that changed on Thursday when the Rainbows opened their season with a victory over Texas-Arlington, winning with a score of 10-4. This was the Rainbow Wahine's first victory at the Paradise Classic, Feb. 9 – 12. The tournament bracket showcased teams from all around the country: University of Hawai'i, Brigham Young University, Loyola Marymount University, Southern Mississippi, University Texas-Arlington and Texas State University.

Coming into the final day of the tournament, the number-one seated Rainbows held a record of 4-1 and faced Texas-Arlington, a team who had just defeated Southern Mississippi to earn the match up with Hawai'i.

The Mavericks wasted no time as they attacked in the top of the first inning by putting two runs on the board. The Rainbow Wahine replied immediately, scoring two runs of their own in the bottom of the first. Freshman short-stop Clare Warwick started off the good pace by getting to first on four balls. Sophomore outfielder Valana Manuma then pulled off a sacrifice bunt to move Warwick to second base.

Kaulana Gould was set in position to make a statement, and she did with a hit to center field, which would score Warwick from second. The Mavericks choice to try to throw out home allowed Gould to reach second. Junior first baseman Tyleen Tausaga came to the plate and hit a double to the gap in right center field, driving in Gould from second.

With the score being knotted up at two a piece, UTA retaliated by scoring a run in the top of the second to regain the lead. UTA pitching closed all pockets of opportunity for UH for the rest of the game. The Rainbow Wahine came close to lighting up the scoreboard once again, with runners on second and third, but they never reached home plate.

The Mavericks extended their lead with three more runs at the start of the fifth inning to extend their lead to 6-2.

Gould led Hawai'i with two hits, a run scored and an RBI. Brandi Peiler went 2-3 at the plate, and Tausaga was 1-3 with a RBI.

The Rainbow Wahine's new freshman pitcher, Courtney Baughman, seemed pleased with how the weekend went overall. "I think we had a good

first weekend," Baughman said. "The girls hit really well and it was a good first outing. We are looking forward to playing this next week against Utah and in the UNLV tournament."

Newcomer Justine Smethurst, who came to Hawai'i from Australia, was also pleased with the opening week of play. "It was a great start to our season and our first chance to play against real opposition. We were the number one seed going into the final," Smethurst said. "The tournament revealed a lot about our team's character and the potential we have. It was a chance to get out our first game jitters and a great way to start the season down Rainbow Road."

2/09/06-UH wins 10-4 over Texas-Arlington

In their first meeting with Texas-Arlington, Hawai'i hammered the Mavericks with a 10-4 win. Hawai'i jumped to an early lead of 4-0 by the bottom of the first, and continued their conquest over the next three innings. In the fourth, UH freshman Justine Smethurst ran into a little trouble with her pitching and gave two walks and allowed a double hit, bringing the Mavericks up to 4-4. Though the Rainbow Wahine were determined in their game and came back in the fifth to secure their win over UTA with a double steal and a two-run single by UH senior Kristi Yoshizawa.

2/10/06-UH defeated 0-4 by BYU

The No. 25 Brigham Young Cougars (3-1) shut out Hawai'i (4-0) in the second game. The Cougars had leapt to a fast start, linking together four straight hits and scoring three runs in the bottom of the first inning. The Cougars extended their claws in the fifth and extended their lead after hitting a triple.

2/10/06-UH wins 2-1 over Southern Miss

Southern Mississippi (2-1) was held scoreless for the first five innings as UH pitcher Jessica Morton struck out eight Golden Eagle batters. UH scored first in the second inning, and the fifth started off right with a single to left field. USM tried to crawl back in the sixth, but only managed a single run as Hawai'i took the game at 2-1.
