Before coming here, Jim served as Head of Public Services at Thormodsgard Law Library, University of North Dakota; as County Attorney for Treasure County, Montana; as a private practitioner in Montana; and as law clerk to Montana Supreme Court Justice John C. Harrison. Regrettably for us, Jim is returning to Grand Forks, North Dakota, where Diana Wells, his wife of eighteen years and a Ph.D. in

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Mathematics from Washington State University, has secured a faculty position at the University of North Dakota.
