The Magic of Pantomime

Pantomime is one of the oldest performing art forms. Today it still exists as Piccolo Theatre, Commedia del' arte in Italy, the classic theatre in Greece and many traditional oriental theatres and dances in India, China and Japan. During antiquity, the Mime had at its disposal a large assortment of conventional gestures as well as the mimodrama, including a narrator, whose oral explanations were interwoven with the action of the mimes.

The essence of Pantomime is a colorfully polished and condensed art form of our ordinary gestures of mimicries. The Pantomime artist uses his body as a dramatic instrument without external help, no costumes, no scenery, only with a minimum of lighting and musical accompaniment, because Mime is the art of silence. All objects on stage are imaginary. The imagined existence of an object will become real only when the muscular disturbances imposed by the object is suitably conveyed by the body of the performer. The role of the audience at a performance of Pantomime is to follow into the imaginary or fantasy world of the artist at the moment of presentation.

Yass Hakoshima

Yass Hakoshima was born and educated in Japan. He studied modern dance with Erick Hawkins in New York and mime with Etienne Decroux, the great master who taught Marcel Marceau. Hakoshima began his career in 1956 when he became a member of the first Western Pantomime group in Tokyo. Between 1963 and 1966 he had three extensive tours in Holland and Germany where he was commissioned to choreograph plays by Jean Cocteau, Paul Poertner and Guenther Wisenborn.

He has taught mime as a guest artist at the Netherland Mime Theater, Amsterdam, the Max Reinhardt School in Berlin, the University of Cologne and Wiesbaden Conservatory.

Truly a touring artist, Hakoshima appears at international festivals from Edinburgh to Mexico. In the United States alone he has performed at more than three hundred universities and colleges. This year his tour includes Australia, New Zealand, The May Festival in Wiesbaden, and the International Theatre Festival in Berlin, Germany, followed by the Festival of Two Worlds in Spoleto, Italy.

Renate Boué

She has been performing and stage managing with her husband Yass Hakoshima since 1963. She has studied dance with Marie Gunther and Carl Orff in Germany, and with Martha Graham and Erick Hawkins in the U.S.A. She maintains her own dance company in the New York City area.
