

Pacific Islands Resources Directory Update

The 8th Annual Pacific Islands Studies Conference, held in January, 1983, brought together a number of Pacific Islands specialists from various departments and professional schools throughout the University system. The forum was used to discuss the numerous Pacific Islands oriented programs and services at UH; some recently established, and others of long standing.

This special edition of the Pacific Islands Studies Newsletter is an updating of the Pacific Islands Resources Directory. Since the Directory's publication in 1977, there has been a proliferation of Pacific Islands oriented projects at UH. With urging from the conference participants, the Steering Committee for the 8th Annual Conference has collected the information and wrote an introduction for the updating of the Directory. It is hoped that this publication will stimulate a "second chance opportunity" for our readers within the UH system who have not yet submitted a description of their Pacific Islands projects. Further project descriptions will be published in the regular newsletter as they are received.

INTRODUCTION

Since World War II, and even before, Hawaii has striven to serve as a bridge between the Mainland U.S. and the Pacific Island nations. The University of Hawaii plays a major role in that effort.

Since its establishment in 1907, the University of Hawaii has served as a multidimensional university operation conducting education, public service programs, and research for the State of Hawaii, the Pacific Basin, and the total world community.

This directory has been compiled as an initial attempt to inform people of the wide range of current Pacific programs and activities conducted at the University of Hawaii. The true extent of the University of Hawaii's involvement and interest in the Pacific, however, cannot be fully described by the directory alone. Hopefully the following descriptions of programs and research will serve as a guide to those of us interested in the future development of the Pacific and its people.
