Mr. FRANCIS SANFORD, Vice President of the Conseil de Gouvernement of French Polynesia, has asked Dr. JAN NEWHOUSE of the General Science Department to assist the Territory as it makes its transition into political autonomy and decreased economic dependence. Dr. Newhouse is to select an uninhabited atoll in the Tuamotus as a site for research in aquaculture, agriculture, and energy production with local resources. Subsequently, teams will live and work a life style that can possibly reverse the Westernized trends of recent years. Emphasis will be on diversification, appropriate technology, indigenous knowledge, and a melding of ancient knowledge with modern approaches.

MEETING WITH THE GILBERT ISLANDS DELEGATION

As announced by a special mailing (November 2), interested faculty and students were able to meet with The Honorable Ieremia Tabai, Chief Minister of the Gilbert Islands, and his visiting delegation on the afternoon of November 9. Chief Minister Tabai's delegation consisted of:

Chief Minister Tabai and his delegation were en route from the Gilberts to London where negotiations pertaining to the achievement of political independence for the Gilbert Islands took place. (No news about the outcome of those negotiations has been received.) A small meeting was first held with the delegation and representatives from the College of Tropical Agriculture, School of Public Health, Social Science Research Institute, Culture Learning Institute (E-W Center), Joint Institute for Marine and Atmospheric Research, and Pacific Islands Studies Program.

It was pointed out that the Gilberts will be closer in geographical proximity to Hawaii than any other independent nation in the Pacific. The Gilberts currently have a small market for their marine products in Honolulu and desire to have a closer relationship with Hawaii in the future. More specifically, they hope to develop more commercial ties with Hawaii and perhaps draw upon University of Hawaii faculty members with specialties relevant to their development plans. Those plans include development of:

- a) Christmas Island with projects in aquaculture, forestry, agriculture, and small scale tourism for sport fishermen.
- b) tuna fishing industry. The Gilberts have recently acquired one fishing ship and personnel are being trained to manage a fishing industry.
- c) subsistence agriculture for village dwellers throughout the Gilberts.

A larger meeting of faculty and students with the Gilbertese delegation was co-sponsored by the East-West Center's Open Grant's Program. Chief Minister Tabai and his colleagues responded to a wide range of questions regarding the problems faced by a small nation of 56,000 people and their aspirations for the future.

Chief Minister Tabai and his colleagues are expected to stop in Honolulu on their return home early next year. It may be possible to learn about the results of their negotiations in London at that time.

STUDY ABROAD IN TAHITI

Dr. JACK H. WARD, Department of Indo-Pacific Languages, is again offering a Summer Abroad Program for Tahitian Language and Culture Studies. NEW M.A. DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

Revisions of the requirements for the M.A. Degree (both Plan A and Plan B) in the Pacific Islands Studies Program have been under consideration since last spring. The revisions were completed during this Fall Semester and have been approved by the Graduate Division. The revised requirements take effect at the beginning of Spring Semester, 1979. Students entering the Program on or after January, 1979 are subject to the new degree requirements. Students enrolled in the Program prior to 1979, may complete their degrees under the old requirements. They also have the option to complete their degrees under the revised requirements.

All PIP faculty members have copies of the new requirements (dated "Final Draft-October, 1978), and copies have been mailed to students currently enrolled and those admitted for Spring Semester, 1979. Additional copies are available from the PIP office.
