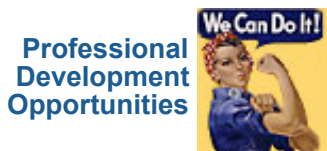

New School of Hawaiian Knowledge



On July 1, the new Hawai'inuiakea School of Hawaiian Knowledge was born. Approved by the UH Board of Regents in May, the new school joins faculty in Hawaiian Language and

Hawaiian Studies to create a new school for indigenous studies. With this reorganization, the Hawaiian Language Program is no longer an instructional unit in the College of LLL. The former department of HIPLL has been renamed the Department of Indo-Pacific Languages and Literatures (IPLL), but Spalding Hall continues to house Hawaiian language faculty for the immediate future. In addition, the Center for Hawaiian Studies ceases to be a unit of SHAPS. To reflect this change, SHAPS now has a new name, the School of Pacific and Asian Studies (SPAS). All existing Hawaiian programs continue to offer their courses, degrees, and services. We send them best wishes and aloha as they embark on this new initiative.

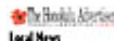

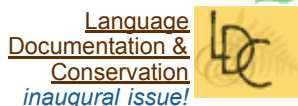

Satellite programming



We subscribe to three channels via satellite: [AZN](#) Television, which features Asian programming, [TV5](#) (French), and [CCTV4](#) (Mandarin). You may view programming in the viewing room, MH156, or in Moore Hall departmental lounges. Although we subscribe to three channels, we can only view one of them at a time. Please contact [Dan Tom](#) to request that he show a channel at a particular time.

Videos and DVDs on reserve



Faculty may place videos or DVDs for their courses on reserve for viewing in our viewing room. LLC has two zone-free DVD players in the viewing room so instructors may now place any zone DVD on reserve. Faculty may also put reserve materials on a shelf in the Mac Lab for anyone to check out from the Mac Lab monitor by presenting a valid UH ID card and signing a log. ID cards are kept until the user returns the materials. Students must view videos and DVDs in the viewing room; there is no overnight checkout available to students. Since the viewing room stays open longer than the Mac Lab, students may return materials kept out after 4:00pm to the PC lab. To place a video or DVD on reserve, please bring it to our office in MH256 first so we may give it a code number.
