Impact of University Contracts in the Pacific - American Samoa

From time to time this Newsletter refers to contracts which the University has entered into for services to be performed for Pacific polities. Such references tend to obscure the impact which University contract involvement may have on a broad swath of faculty. The report of the American Samoa Contract (education) for the first half of 1972 provides an illustration: Under the contract, two U.H. faculty members taught credit courses in Samoa during the year-end interim, and another 10 did the same during the Summer period. A total of 8 consultants and non-credit workshop leaders were recruited from the Manoa campus for services to be rendered in Samoa during the six months' period, and 2 more from other units of the Iniversity. The net effect was to bring a considerable number of faculty members face-to-face with Samoan problems, each within his respective area of expertese.
