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## Land Study in the Trust Territory

The U.S. Trust Territory has requested assistance from the University's Land Study Bureau to develop a proposal for a land classification program as a means of compiling an inventory of the Trust Territory's land resources. A classification and inventory of these resources would be useful in locating areas suitable for cropping and grazing, reserved watershed, and urban purposes, thus contributing to the orderly and logical development of these islands.

Pacific Manuscripts Bureau (PAMBU)

The Pacific Manuscripts Bureau was established in 1968 to promote the preservation of unpublished manuscripts relating to the Pacific Islands. It is a non-profit making organization sponsored by four libraries specializing in Pacific research-

- Australia:       The Mitchell Library, Sydney  
                  The National Library of Australia, Canberra
- New Zealand:    The National Library of New Zealand, Wellington
- United States:  The Library of the University of Hawaii, Honolulu

The Bureau is operated on the libraries' behalf by the Research School of Pacific Studies of the Australian National University.

The specific aim of the Bureau is to locate manuscripts which may be of value, either now or in the future, to research workers engaged in any branch of Pacific studies, whether historical, literary, or scientific. Its area of interest comprises all the Pacific Islands.

While the main concern of the Bureau is to copy manuscripts by photography or other means and then return them to their owners, it will be glad to arrange, should the owner so desire, for their deposit in any library or archives, with or without restrictions on access.

The material sought for by the Bureau is of all kinds: letters to and from island residents; diaries and note books; missionary, trading and shipping records (including account books and ships' log books); plantation diaries, accounts and journals; grammars, dictionaries and vocabularies; local family documents and notes; unpublished histories, scientific papers, etc.; letters, stories, genealogies and other manuscripts written by islanders in their own languages.

The executive officer of the Bureau is Robert Langdon, headquartered at the Research School of Pacific Studies, A.N.U., Canberra. Hawaii contact for PAMBU is the Pacific Collection, Sinclair Library.

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U.H. Studies on Culture and Mental Health in the Pacific

A cooperative program between the Institute of Advanced Projects of the East-West Center and the University's Social Science Research Institute for research on mental health in Asia and the Pacific is being conducted under a research grant awarded by NIMH. Anthropologists, psychiatrists, psychologists, and sociologists are being brought together with the object of focusing attention on the general topic-areas of culture and behavior, mental health and socio-economic development, the community and mental health, folk therapy, and the problems of methodology, especially as related to cross-cultural application of testing procedures and psychiatric diagnosis. Funded in 1967, the program will extend to 1972.

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Anthropological Research in Micronesia (1954-1968)

The U.H. Department of Anthropology has issued Bulletin #4 of its Micronesian Program which surveys over 200 titles on Micronesian people and culture published between 1954 and April 1968. Also included is reference to anthropologists working in this area of the Pacific.

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U.H. Geophysicists Cooperate with Australians in Seismic Refraction Exploration

A four-man team from the Hawaii Institute of Geophysics will conduct field work on New Britain and New Ireland, Papua/New Guinea, in cooperation with an Australian group sponsored by the Australian Bureau of Mineral Resources. For approximately six weeks, starting in March, a vast seismic refraction exploration project will be undertaken to study the geologic structure of the islands.
