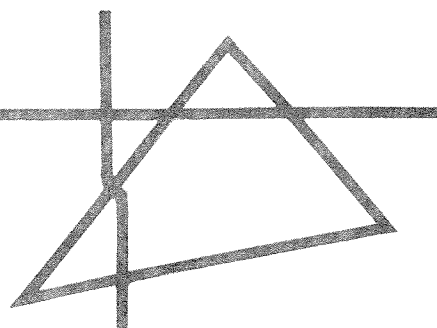

## VISITORS AND TRAVELERS

ROGER GREEN of the Department of Anthropology at the University of Auckland, New Zealand is currently working at the Bishop Museum. He is in-between field trips to the Southeast Solomon Islands, working with Douglas Yen and Pat Kirch on the Southeast Solomon Island Culture History Program, a research program aimed at sorting out the prehistory of the Southeast Solomons. While here Dr. Green will also be finishing up a final draft of work he initiated a few years back on the archaeology of the Makaha area. He will be leaving here March 20 for the Solomons and can be reached in the meantime at the Bishop Museum Department of Anthropology.

Dr. LANGI KAVALIKU of Tonga, Dr. BERRIEN MOORE of the University of New Hampshire, ADA DEMB formerly a Research Scholar at the Austrian International Institute of Applied Systems Analysis (now of Honolulu), Dr. HISASHI ISHITANI of the University of Tokyo, BUDI SUDARSONO of the Indonesian National Atomic Energy Agency, Dr. ANTHONY VIGNAUX of the University of Victoria in New Zealand, and NICHOLAS R. MILLER of the Australian Industries Assistance Commission have arrived at the East-West Center where they shall be working as Senior Fellows with Open Grants through May 31 on the question of development alternatives through the year 2000. It is our understanding that Dr. Kavaliku is temporarily back on Tonga due to a family emergency.

Dr. RICHARD JOHNSON of the Graduate School of Business, Stanford University has passed through Honolulu on his way to the Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands. He has been sent by the Department of the Interior to help supply information to the Carter Administration for future planning. At press time there was no word on how to reach Dr. Johnson here or in the TT but it may be possible for interested persons to get something of an itinerary from the State Department Liaison Office director, Mr. Robert Laws (546-2103).

Dr. SATORU IZUTSU, chairman of the International Health Program, School of Public Health will be leaving the weekend of February 11-12 to visit Indonesia for about three weeks. He will be providing some consultation during his visit and will be exploring the possibility of conducting an administrative and management workshop for Indonesian family planning agencies. He will also be stopping at Lampang, Thailand to review the Lampang Health Project.

IKINI HALLOWAY of Papua New Guinea is currently at the East-West Center. We hope to have more details in the next Newsletter.

### PUBLICATION ANNOUNCED

### A CONFERENCE ON CAPTAIN COOK FOR PACIFIC-INTERESTED FACULTY THROUGH THE STATE-WIDE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

The Captain Cook conference promises to be quite an event. It is scheduled for March 31 and April 1, not far away for those who would like to get involved but have made no definite plans yet. Sponsored by the Pacific Islands Study Center in cooperation with the Pacific Islands Studies Program and the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council, it will consider the scientific, ethnographic, strategic and economic importance of Captain James Cook's voyages to the Pacific.

Special guest speaker on the evening of March 31 (Friday) will be Dr. Edward C. Creutz, recently appointed Director of the Bishop Museum. He will speak on the role of the Museum in the Pacific.

The Saturday (April 1) session will be busy with presentations by Dr. Pauline Joerger (UH History Dept.), Dr. Donald Johnson (UH History Dept.), Dr. James McCutcheon (UH History Dept. and UH Dept. Am. Studies), Dr. Craig Severns (UH-Hilo), Professor William Bonk (UH-Hilo), Professor Bruce Palmer (Maui CC), Professor Richard Mayer (Maui-CC), Dr. Y. H. Yang (EWC), Mr. John Charles (EWC) and others from the UH Manoa Campus. The sessions will end by 3:00 p.m. on Saturday.
