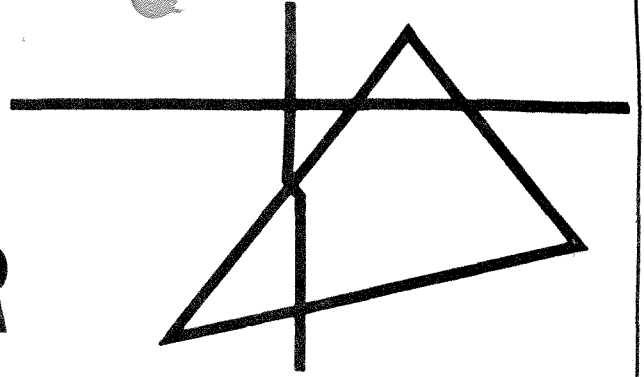

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USP/UH COOPERATIVE EDUCATION EFFORT

Since 1981, University of Hawaii linguists have been sharing their expertise with educators in the South Pacific. LAWRENCE A. REID (Department of Linguistics) and PRESCILA ESPIRITU (Department of Indo-Pacific Languages) spent six weeks on Tarawa, early this year, conducting a course in Basic Linguistics for 15 Kiribati school teachers. The course was sponsored by the University of the South Pacific (Suva) and was held at the USP Extension Centre at Teoraereke, Tarawa. A similar course was conducted in 1981 in Apia, Western Samoa by DONALD M. TOPPING (Social Science Research Institute) and HOWARD P. MCKAUGHAN (Linguistics). Plans are underway for a linguistics course to be held in Vila, Vanuatu in January, 1983, and follow-up courses on the structure of Pacific Languages are being proposed for each of these regions.

ATTENTION GRADUATE STUDENTS

Graduate students in Pacific Islands Studies are asked to see Dr. Kiste for academic advising before the beginning of the fall 1982 semester. Appointments should be made for dates between August 10 and 20, 1982. Registration will be August 23, 24, and 26. Classes begin on August 30.

NEW PIP STUDENTS

Two new students will begin their master's degree in Pacific Islands Studies during the 1982 fall semester. They are Mr. MARK BERG of Guam and Mr. BIKENIBEU PAENIU of Tuvalu. Both men are East-West Center Grantees in Open Grants.

PACIFIC ISLANDS LECTURE: DR. MARSHALL SAHLINS

On June 17, 1982, Dr. MARSHALL SAHLINS, noted Pacific Islands Anthropologist, gave a lecture entitled "Captain James Cook or the Dying God." The event was open to the public and jointly sponsored by the UH Department of Anthropology, Hawaiian Studies and the Pacific Islands Studies Program.

PAAC LUNCHEON

Dr. RENATE PLATZÖDER, Attorney-at-Law, was the guest speaker at a Kahala Hilton Luncheon on June 16, 1982. Dr. Platzöder is a senior staff member of the Institute for International Affairs, Ebenhausen -- Munich, Federal Republic of Germany. Since 1974 she has been a member of the delegation of the Federal Republic of Germany to the third U.N. Conference on the Law of the Sea and as such she was a participant in the recent negotiations held in New York City.

Dr. Platzöder is the author of numerous publications on law of the sea; a member of the executive board of the Law of the Sea Institute, University of Hawaii; and a lecturer for International Law at the University of Munich.

Her topic at the luncheon was "Recent Law of the Sea Developments and Their Effects on the Pacific". The affair was jointly sponsored by the Pacific and Asian Affairs Council, Law of the Sea Institute, and Hawaii Ocean Law Association.

PACIFIC ISLANDS COURSES IN ANTHROPOLOGY

The UH department of Anthropology is fortunate to have Dr. WARD GOODENOUGH, well-known Cultural Anthropologist, as a visiting professor for the 1982-83 academic year. In the fall, Dr. Goodenough will teach two courses: Anth 414, "Introduction to Linguistic Anthropology" and Anth 750 E, a graduate seminar in social anthropology concentrating on Melanesia. In the spring he will teach Anth 330, "Social Organization" and Anth 750 E, a graduate seminar in social anthropology concentrating on Micronesia.

PIP DIRECTOR TO TEACH ANTHROPOLOGY IN MICRONESIA

The Department of Education of the Marshall Islands has asked Pacific Islands Studies Director, Dr. ROBERT KISTE to teach a course on the Peoples of Micronesia this summer, in Majuro. The 5-week course will be attended by Marshall Islands high school teachers.

PTC '83

The fifth annual Pacific Telecommunications Conference (PTC) will be held in Honolulu, January 16-19, 1983. PTC '83 will be the first international communications conference to be held during the United Nations' World Communications Year. Some of the planned topics which are perhaps of particular interest to the Pacific Islands are: User Requirements, National Policies and Infrastructures, Regional and International Satellite Systems, Undersea Fiber Optics, Trade Considerations, Weather/Emergency Warning, etc.

WOMEN'S STUDIES CONFERENCE: CALL FOR PAPERS

An international conference entitled "Concepts and Strategies: Women's Studies in Different Cultural Contexts" will be sponsored by the Women's Studies Program of the University of Hawaii in November, 1982.

According to Conference Coordinator NANCY CARAWAY, the purpose of the conference is "to assess the impact of Women's Studies and feminist scholarship in natural science, social science and the humanities on the social, cultural, and political aspects of the female experience in Hawaii, Asia and the Pacific."

Papers from women and men are solicited. An abstract of 200-500 words is due by July 1, 1982 to be considered for presentation. Full papers are due by October 1, 1982. Ten of these will be selected to receive a \$200 cash award payable on presentation of the paper in Hawaii.

Abstracts will be published in a special issue of the University of Hawaii Women's Studies Program Working Papers Series.

Plans are underway for a symposium volume based on selected papers presented at the Conference.

NEW PUBLICATION FROM MARC

DIRK BALLENDORF, Director of the Micronesian Area Research Center sent us the following release:

The Micronesian Area Research Center (MARC) announces the publication of a new pamphlet, *The Mariana Islands*, published originally in 1889 in French, now translated into English by University of Guam Professor Sylvia E. Cheng and edited by MARC associate editor Robert D. Craig. The fifty-two page booklet is a report written by Antoine-Alfred Marche, a French explorer, ethnographer, and scientist after his two-year visit to the Mariana Islands (1887-1889).

After making the translation in 1981, Professor Cheng visited the Musée de l'Homme (Ethnographic Museum) in Paris where she found to her delight thirty-one original photographs made by Marche during his visit. Twenty of these photographs are reproduced and published for the first time in this MARC translation. They represent the oldest known extant photographs taken of Guam and the Mariana Islands.

One significant photograph is of Father Jose Torres Palomo taken about 1888 when he was fifty-one years of age, the earliest known photograph of him.

The pamphlet includes a short editor's preface and a translator's introduction, and it can be purchased from the Micronesian Area Research Center at a cost of US\$3.25.

UN VISITING MISSION AT UH

A meeting between the UN Trusteeship Council Visiting Mission and Micronesian students at the University of Hawaii was held on the UH campus on July 2, 1982. The meeting was arranged by the Pacific Islands Studies Program at the request of the International Communications Agency Reception Center. The Micronesian students in attendance voiced a variety of concerns to the UN representatives.

REGIONAL CONFERENCE OF SENIOR DEVELOPMENT PLANNERS - ISSUES, STRATEGIES AND MARINE RESOURCES

A Regional Conference of Senior Development Planners was held in Suva, Fiji, from 7 to 11 June, to discuss development issues, strategies and marine resources. This conference was held under the joint auspices of the South Pacific Commission (SPC), the South Pacific Bureau for Economic Co-operation (SPEC), the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO) and the German Foundation for International Development (DSE), and was attended by thirteen countries from the SPC region as well as several national and international organizations.

The conference was officially opened by Mr. Savenaca Siwatibau, General Manager of the Central Monetary Authority, Fiji. Key points emerging from the opening statements made by representatives of the four organizing institutions - the Director a.i. of SPEC, Mr. J.P. Sheppard; the SPC Director of Programmes, Mr. W.T. Brown; the UNIDO representative, Dr. Herman Muegge; and Dr. A.G. Friedrich of the German Foundation for International Development (DSE) - include:

- "the need to recognize that the basis of Island economies would continue to be in agriculture, fisheries and forestry;
- that further development of marine resources would be vital for Pacific development;
- that planning capabilities to take account of those needs required strengthening;
- the dialogue and exchange of views and experiences among planners within the region would be helpful;
- that there could be advantages in a regional approach to development planning, combining regional and national objectives."

Mr. Raj Singh, Director of Trade and Industry, Ministry of Industry and Commerce, Fiji, was elected Chairman of the meeting. The SPC Economist, Dr. F.V. Sevele, was one of the co-Directors of the conference. Additional SPC representatives were the Tuna Programme Co-ordinator, Dr. R. Kearney, and Mr. A. Hughes, an SPC consultant.

The conference agreed to draw attention of member Governments and regional institutions to the region's needs for immediate programming of development in the key areas of Ocean Resources, Law of the Sea, Information Flows, Trade and Exchange Rate Policies, Training Activities, and further Planner Meetings. The meeting also recommended that SPEC, SPC, and PIDP jointly produce, in consultation with the Island member countries, a report setting out guidelines on criteria of what constitutes a regional project, priority areas for selection projects, and regional co-ordination by these organizations regarding project-preparation, resources-allocation and intergovernmental co-operation in regional development projects.

The conclusions and recommendations of the conference will be submitted to the 1982 SPC Planning and Evaluation Committee Meeting held 23 - 25 June at SPC headquarters, Noumea, and to the 1982 pre-forum SPC Committee Meeting to be held in August this year.

SPC PLANNING AND EVALUATION COMMITTEE CONCLUDES ITS WORK

The South Pacific Commission Planning and Evaluation Committee, which met at the South Pacific Commission Headquarters over a period of three days, came to end on Friday 25 June 1982. This Committee was chaired by the newly-elected Vice-President of the Government Council of New Caledonia, M. Jean-Marie Tjibaou. The representative of the Federated States of Micronesia, Mr. Pedro Harris, was Vice-Chairman of the Committee meeting.

In a statement at the official opening, the Secretary-General, Honourable M. Young Vivian, welcomed the Secretary-General Designate, Mr. Francis Bugotu, who will take up his new functions as Secretary-General of the SPC on 1 July.

One of the major items for discussion each year is the evaluation of SPC activities in the preceding year. The island governments and administrations expressed their satisfaction at SPC activities in 1981. This year the Committee paid special attention to the Mobile Training Unit for Youth and Community Workers, currently based in Majuro, Marshall Islands. In 1983, the Planning and Evaluation Committee will devote its attention to the Community Education Training Centre in Fiji.

The Secretary-General, Honourable M. Young Vivian, presented the three-year Intergrated Work Programme and Budget for 1983, 1984, and 1985. The Committee was informed that participating governments had increased their contribution to the 1983 budget by 6.69%. The Committee agreed to recommend to the Twenty-Second South Pacific Conference a Work Programme and Budget for 1983 totalling 407,313,600 CFP Francs.

The Committee chose two themes for discussion by the Twenty-Second South Pacific Conference. They are a social theme "Increasing Urbanization: An Inevitable Development?" and an economic theme "Rural Development: The Basis for Progress in the Pacific".
